

# HNRS 1000—Honors Freshman Seminar

Online Section

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HNRS 1000 is a zero-credit course that is required for participation in the Honors Program. This course is designed to enhance students' experiences in the Honors Program. HNRS 1000 will focus on content related to identity formation and worldview construction. Additionally, students will be required to attend all Honors Colloquium events during the semester in which they are enrolled in the class. This course is designed to be taken twice and in sequence, beginning in the fall semester.

## Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will develop critical thinking skills through an examination of the self.
- Students will attend Honors colloquium events.
  - Students will review preparatory material for all colloquium events.
  - Students will participate in a seminar-style discussion about the topics and issues covered in colloquium events.

## Course Materials

All readings and materials will be posted on Canvas or handed out to students in class. Students are expected to keep track of and have course material readily accessible, including any materials on Canvas.

## Evaluation

Students will receive a grade of either "CR" (credit) or "NC" (no credit) for this course. Please keep in mind, as a zero-credit course, no credit hours are earned. In order to receive the grade of CR for this course, students cannot miss more than two class meetings. Additionally, students must earn a satisfactory evaluation on the following assignments:

- Colloquium Attendance
- Seminar Readings and Participation (in class and online)
- Canvas assignments

Students will earn a satisfactory evaluation by preparing and fully participating in the assignments. Students who do not earn a grade of CR in an Honors Seminar will lose good standing in the Honors Program.

## Colloquium Attendance

"Colloquium" is Latin for dialogue or conversation. The Honors Colloquium is an opportunity for students to meet and talk with local, regional, and national leaders and scholars about topics that relate to the semester's courses. The Honors Colloquium series may also include museum trips, service projects, productions, and other leadership and learning activities. **Students are expected to attend the four scheduled colloquia each semester.** The dates for these events are listed below in **bold type**.

If a student must miss a colloquium event for any reason, that student must propose and attend a make-up event on the UT Tyler campus. Make-up events must be approved by the Honors Director (Dr. Streufert) or Coordinator (Ms. Dykes) before attendance of that event, and students may be required submit a 500-word essay summarizing the event. Details about the make-up form and essay requirement can be found on the Honors Program Colloquium webpage.

## **Seminar Reading and Participation**

Each member of the class shares the responsibility for creating a positive and stimulating learning environment. Preparation, participation, and respect for the ideas of others will allow for in-depth exploration of complex issues and examination of multiple perspectives. Your thoughtful comments, questions, and insights are needed to enhance the learning for all students and thus contribute to a creative and constructive experience. Prompt attention in completing all class assignments is required. Late work and/or lack of engagement will negatively impact this part of your grade.
