

PSYC 4341: Personality Theories - Online
Fall 2023

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Best way to contact me: The best way to contact me is through email. Please put your name and class number in the subject line. I will try to respond within 24 hours but understand that if the email is sent Friday evening or on the weekend there may be no response till Monday.

Office Hours: This is an asynchronous online course, so there will be no on-campus or online meetings. But office hours will be available via ZOOM. Each Friday, I will be available from 1:00 pm-2:00 pm for virtual office hours. Link will be made available on Canvas. It is best to email ahead but no appointment is needed to meet with me during office hours. Just wait in the waiting room until the instructor lets you in.

Course Catalog Description: Students will study various theories of personality. The theories covered in this course will include those that originate from several important traditions in psychology (analytic, phenomenological, field, psychometric, biophysical, and behavioristic). Factors that shape personality and the forces that help people behave consistently from one situation to the next will be critically examined. Students will learn how to identify and explain personality characteristics and their functions in a person's life.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1) Achieve content knowledge of how, when, and why different personality characteristics develop, as well as how these characteristics influence a person across his or her lifespan. The purpose of this course is to provide an introduction to the scientific study of how and why personality influences behavior, cognition, emotion, motivation, perception, and values.
- 2) Critical Thinking Skills (includes creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation, and synthesis of information). Students will be able to apply their critical thinking skills throughout this class.
- 3) Communication Skills (includes effective development, interpretation, and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication. Students will be able to apply their communication skills through expression of ideas from personality psychology in online group discussions.
- 4) Social Responsibility (includes intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities) in which the historic interactions of personality psychology may focus prejudice, cultural differences, and shortcomings that are still being addressed in the field.

Required Textbook:

We will be using an Open Textbook provided by **Chris Allen** from **Portland State University Library**. This is being done to reduce the cost to you. There is no physical copy of the textbook, but it will be accessible in three different ways.

1. Each chapter will be linked on canvas and available during the week it is assigned. You can read it through canvas and complete questions or videos that are within the text.
2. You will be able to access it through an internet browser with the following link, <https://pdx.pressbooks.pub/thebalanceofpersonality/>. There are extra chapters that we will not be covering so pay attention to what chapters are assigned each week. Feel free to read ahead or look at chapters that are not assigned for the course.
3. You will be able to download a PDF version of the book which can be read through a pdf viewer. This version may have some limitations on the interactive content but it is searchable and may be useful during quizzes.

If you are having any difficulties with accessing the text, please contact me so that we can fix that quickly.

Course Design:

This is an asynchronous online course. Asynchronous learning happens on your own schedule. **There are no online or on-campus meetings for this course.** You can access all course materials, including readings, videos, presentations, assignments and quizzes via Canvas and complete them on your own schedule. But please keep in mind that you must meet the expected deadlines for each activity.

This class is divided into fifteen weekly modules. Each module contains one chapter. At the end of each chapter, there is a chapter quiz. For each module, there will also be discussion board, an assignment, or both. For each discussion board, you will submit an initial post to the discussion prompt by Friday of the Module week and then respond to two of your classmates` posts by Sunday of the module week.

Each week on Monday the class will start a new module. Within the week, students will manage their time to complete the required assignments that are assigned for the week by **Friday at 11:59 pm!**

Please make sure you have logged into Canvas and reviewed the informational messages explaining the workings of this course. I will make course announcements weekly to help you keep track of what assignments are due and inform you of any important updates within the course.

Late Work and Make-Up Exams: If you miss a graded course requirement for an excused reason (such as a doctor's documented illness, death/funeral, evacuation for a natural disaster, university-related activity, religious observance, etc.), I may accept your late work without any penalty. You will be required to provide an acceptable form of documentation for missing the deadline. That documentation must be submitted via email within 48 hours of missing the course requirement. Please keep in mind that all assignments and tests in the course are available for a window of time not less than 5 days, so due dates are firm if you do not have an acceptable form of documentation.

Graded Course Requirements Information:

Assignments: For each module there may be an assignment that will need to be completed by Sunday. Each assignment is an opportunity to use knowledge from the coursework. Assignments should be completed and uploaded by midnight each Sunday of the Module. Note that last week of the course the assignment will be due Friday at midnight.

Quizzes: For each chapter there will be a quiz. You will have one hour (60 minutes) to complete each quiz. Quizzes must be completed by midnight on each Friday of the module week. The lowest quiz grade will be replaced with the highest quiz grade. If there are any problems or complications with the quizzes, please contact me to help resolve them.

Discussion Boards: For each module there may be a discussion board that will need to be completed. Discussion boards consist of two parts:

- (1) You will submit an initial post as respond to the discussion prompt. Your response must integrate concepts that you learn from the readings and videos and show your critical thinking by discussing your own thoughts, analysis and experiences. You must submit your initial post each week by **Friday. You will get up to 30 points for your initial post.**
- (2) Then, you return to the discussion to comment on at least two classmates` posts. You expand on a classmate`s comments in a value-adding, topic-related way. Reply posts cannot be one-liners, off-topic posts, vague statements, unsupported opinions, inadequate explanations or simply say, "I agree" or "good job." You must submit your two responses each week by **Sunday. You will get up to 10 points for each response.** You can respond to more than two classmates, but you will get points only for your best two responses.

Extra Credit Opportunities: There will be an opportunity for extra credit that will be made available during the semester. This opportunity will require more effort than one of the regular weekly assignments, but it is worth half a letter grade. It will be due by midnight of Friday December 1st.

Withdrawing from Class - Students you are allowed to withdraw ([Links to an external site.](#)) (drop) from this course through the University's Withdrawal Portal ([Links to an external site.](#)). Incomplete Grade Policy: If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in lieu of a grade only when all of the following conditions are met: (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all course work or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor; and (c) the student presents these reasons prior to the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average for a student. The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to complete all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has not been assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F, or to NC if the course was originally taken under the CR/NC grading basis.

Grade Appeal Policy: - UT Tyler's Grade Appeal policy requires the completion of a Grade Appeal form for this action to take place. The grade appeal begins with the instructor of your course. If you do not agree with the decision of the instructor, you may then move your appeal to the department chair/school director for that course.
