<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>: Art 2304 is a face-to-face introductory survey course focusing on artworks from the Renaissance, Baroque, Rococo, Neoclassical, 19th and 20th Century periods to Contemporary, primarily examining works from Europe and the Americas. The iconography, stylistic development, cultural and historical context of various sculptures, paintings, prints, architecture, videos and installations will be studied, as well as their function and meaning within society.

<u>COURSE OBJECTIVES</u>: This course aims to provide a chronological account of the history of art. It seeks to develop visual literacy through the analysis of works of art, and to develop critical thinking skills through lectures, readings, writing assignments and class discussions. Three examinations will test the student's general knowledge of information gained from class lectures and text. There are two papers, a group project and an attendance and participation grade.

Core Course Student Learning Outcomes are: by the end of this course students should be able to...

- **THINK CRITICALLY**: Critical thinking skills include (but are not limited to) creative thinking, innovation, inquiry and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
 - Students will learn to critically analyze works of art and architecture from the Pre-Historic to the Late Medieval period. They will learn how to analyze form (composition, technique, color, light/shadow) to determine how these elements work together to create meaning in art and architecture. Critical thinking skills will be assessed through two short papers and quiz questions.
- **COMMUNICATE ABOUT ART USING ART HISTORICAL METHODOLOOGIES**: Communication skills include (but are not limited to) effective development, interpretation and extemporaneous expression of ideas through written and oral communication.
 - Students will analyze works of art, current scholarship, and contemporary methodologies through assigned readings and class discussion. Students will be assessed through quiz questions.
- **WORK IN TEAMS**: Teamwork skills include (but are not limited to) the ability to consider different points of view and work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.
 - Students will be organized into groups to prepare and present an online exhibition of sculpture in order to compare and contrast works of art and demonstrate an understanding of formal elements and historical context. Teamwork skills will be assessed through the group project and self / peer assessment.
- **BE SOCIALLY RESPONSIBLE BY UNDERSTANDING ART WITHIN CULTURAL AND HISTORICAL CONTEXTS**: Social responsibility skills include (but are not limited to) intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities. Students will recognize the historical/cultural importance of objects, buildings, or place and the necessity of preservation.
 - Students will develop a knowledge base of multiple cultures and understand how ethnic, racial, cultural, and gender issues are present within works of art. Students will be assessed through class discussion and quiz (exam) questions.

<u>CLASS FORMAT</u>: F2F - Power-point illustrated lectures, class discussion of readings and images. If you are ill or have an emergency situation, contact either Dr. Lisot or the TA to let them know why you will not be in class. There are some recordings of old lectures available online that you can watch and reply to questions to earn participation credit; however, this is only to be used if you are unable to attend class in person for a day or so and must be cleared with Dr. Lisot first.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION in class discussions are required. In the event of an absence the student is responsible for obtaining class lecture notes from a classmate. You will receive a participation grade, which is 10% of the total grade. The professor may ask questions in class on assigned readings. Attendance in this course is mandatory. Excessive tardiness will count as absenteeism. **Each absence count off 5 points out of total attendance grade**. See "Class Format" above for further info.

READING ASSIGNMENTS: should be completed <u>before</u> the lectures for which they are assigned. A course calendar with assigned readings will be posted on Canvas. Be prepared to discuss the readings in class.

EXAMINATIONS: There will be three examinations (15 %, 20% & 20%, consecutively, of the final grade), consisting of image identification and/ or comparisons, multiple choice questions and an essay. Students are required to memorize the following ID information for artworks: (1) title, (2) artist/architect/patron, (3) date, (4) period (Renaissance, Baroque, Impressionism, etc., (5) materials, and (6) location (if in situ). The exam may have essay questions as well. Exams will be taken online on Canvas and are open book and open notes.

Each examination will cover only the material since the previous exam (in other words, no cumulative exams or final). Instructions for the exam will be posted on Canvas. A slide list of images covered will be posted on Canvas for each exam. See course calendar for dates of the exams. <u>Please read any professor comments on your exams in order to improve for the next exam.</u>

ONE PAPER: Formal Analysis <u>Compare and Contrast Paper</u> (20% of final grade) of two artworks (one Renaissance and the other Baroque, chosen from class Slide List #1 and/or #2); guidelines will be provided, 6 pages, double spaced, cited using Chicago Manual of Style formatting with footnotes and bibliography. All papers will be uploaded on Canvas. NO LATE PAPERS ARE ACCEPTED.

GROUP PROJECT: A group project will be assigned to create a replica of a 19th Century painting (Neo-Classical, Realist, Impressionist, Post-Impressionist, etc.), photograph it and submit the photo to Dr. Lisot before class on day it is due. Students must complete a self-assessment to receive credit. **This project will require your group to meet outside of class time.** (15%)

SUBMISSION OF ASSIGNMENTS: Students are expected to keep electronic copies of all assignments turned in to the professor. Students will upload papers on Canvas, which will check for plagiarism. Please do not e-mail any assignments to the professor.

A course calendar with exam and assignment due dates will be posted up on Canvas.

Papers will be uploaded on Canvas; Group Project will be uploaded on Canvas. Exams will be taken online on Canvas and are open book, but the ability to recognize and identify artworks on the slide list is required. Grades will be posted on Canvas. Students are responsible to check online to be sure that their grades have posted and are correct. If a grade is missing that means that the professor did not receive your work. Contact Dr. Lisot immediately if you think there is an error.

FALSE CITATIONS ARE CONSIDERED PLAGIARISM & EARN A GRADE OF ZERO FOR A PAPER. The citation must be to the correct source: with correct page numbers, author, edition and/or URL. Be aware that AI often makes false citations but you will be penalized for them.

INFORMATION ON PLAGIARISM CONTINUED:

a. It is unacceptable to copy something out of a book, newspaper, journal, Internet site or any printed source without citing your source. The most blatant example of this is directly copying something word for word. This includes artificial intelligence programs. It does not matter if it's only a phrase. If it is not yours, you must either not use it or place it in quotes and reference it.

- b. **If you paraphrase another person's words or ideas, you still must cite them as a source.** Do not put a paraphrase in quotes, but be sure to give the author's name, the text and the page where you found the idea. (Use normal citation format.)
- c. In the "Critical Response Papers" in which all citations are from one single source given to you by the professor, you still must use Chicago Manual citation format in a footnote to cite the author. You will be required to do some outside research to find out information about the author. This source must be cited, both in the footnote and in the bibliography. Online sources also require an accession date (date you viewed it)
