Course Description:

An introduction to marine biology. The course will investigate the various marine ecosystems that make up our planet from cold water to tropical ecosystems. The course will also delve into current manmade obstacles as well as ways that these are being mitigated. The class will rely on peer review articles.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the semester students will:

- 1) Identify differences between different marine ecosystems and the problems facing them.
- 2) Describe research questions that can be addressed in marine ecosystems and have a better understanding of the challenges facing marine field work.
- 3) Analyze and interpret data from primary literature.
- 4) Effectively communicate and interpret the significance of research findings.
- 5) Discuss and evaluate conclusions reached from marine biology primary literature based on the proposed hypothesis and presented results.
- 6) Present an effective science communication project.

- Incomplete Grade Policy: If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in place of a grade only when all of the following conditions are met: (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all coursework or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor, and
- (c) the student presents these reasons before the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average. The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to meet all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has yet to be assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F, or NC. If the course was initially taken under the CR/NC grading basis, this may adversely affect the student's academic standing.
- Grade Appeal Policy: Disputes regarding grades must be initiated within sixty (60) days from the date of receiving the final course grade by filing a Grade Appeal Form with the instructor who assigned the grade; this is separate from the Application for Appeal form submitted to the Student Appeals Committee, which does not rule on grade disputes as described in this policy. If the student is not satisfied with the decision, the student may appeal in writing to the Chairperson of the department from which the grade was issued. In situations where there is an allegation of capricious grading, discrimination, or unlawful actions, appeals may go beyond the Chairperson to the Dean of the college from which the grade was issued, with that decision being final. The Grade Appeal form is found in the Registrar's Form Library.
