<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION</u>: This course provides an overview of the structure and function of the human body.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: Upon completion of BIOL 2301, the student will

- 1. Critical Thinking: Apply basic concepts of physical science to human biology
- 2. Communication: Demonstrate the ability to communicate scientific information and theory in writing
- 3. Empirical & Quantitative Skills: Interpret scientific graphs, tables, and charts
- 4. Teamwork: Consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.
- 5. Define and correctly apply anatomical and physiological terminology
- 6. Define homeostasis and explain its role in human function, using specific examples for the integumentary, skeletal, muscular, and nervous systems.
- 7. Describe the structure and function of the integumentary system, skeletal system, muscular system, and nervous systems
- 8. List the levels of biological organization and apply them to the study of human anatomy and physiology
- 9. Describe the structure and function of the various cell types in the body
- 10. Apply concepts of human anatomy and physiology to real situations

<u>GENERAL</u>: As soon as possible, log onto Canvas and spend some time exploring the materials available. Check Canvas and your student email DAILY for new announcements or messages.

COVID Requirements: It is important to take the necessary precautions to ensure a healthy and successful year. UT Tyler continues to urge you to protect yourselves against the flu, COVID and any new threats that may be developing. Be diligent about preventive measures such as washing hands, covering sneezes/coughs, social distancing and vaccinations, which have proven to be successful in slowing the spread of viruses. Encourage those who don't feel well to stay home, and if they show symptoms, ask them to get tested for the flu or COVID. Self-isolation is important to reduce exposure (CDC quarantine/isolation guidelines). Please work with your faculty members to maintain coursework and please consult <u>existing campus resources</u> for support.

To get the most out of class, you should:

- Read the assigned text chapter <u>before</u> we get to it in class
- Before lecture (generally at the beginning of each chapter), watch any **lecture videos** that are posted in canvas.
- For each subsequent lecture (after the first one for each chapter), CAREFULLY read through approximately 50 PPT slides (which is the number we average per class) to prepare for class and maximize your class participation scores.
- **Print the PowerPoint files or** upload them on a device you will be using for the semester; most students print four slides to a page for the purpose of taking notes in class; if you do not take notes, you will MISS CRITICAL EXAM INFORMATION, because the PPT files are NOT complete. Research has shown that you will learn more by taking notes on PAPER than typing on a computer or pad.
- Some lectures may also have study handouts that should be printed from Canvas (in color, if possible).

If we finish a chapter with class time remaining, then we will start the next scheduled chapter, because every

minute is precious. We will discuss the majority of the **anatomy** in the **LABORATORY**, and **NOT** in the **lecture**. Lecture will focus on **physiological principles**.

I welcome questions in person or if more convenient, you can call, e-mail, or Zoom. <u>Please</u> do not hesitate to ask questions about class material! **There is no such thing as a stupid CONTENT question. Honestly, it is only stupid NOT to ASK them.** It is VERY difficult to improve your course average after you fail the first exam in a course like A&P, so PLEASE contact me for help or studying tips EARLY in the semester, before it is too late to make a difference. However, keep in mind that questions about items clearly covered on the **syllabus** /**schedule** or **posted on Canvas**, will **NOT** be **answered**. My response will direct you to the answer location <u>only</u>, so please look for the answer <u>before</u> contacting me.

Recording of Class Sessions:

Class sessions may be recorded by the instructor for use by students enrolled in this course. Recordings that contain personally identifiable information or other information subject to FERPA shall not be shared with individuals not enrolled in this course unless appropriate consent is obtained from all relevant students. Class recordings are reserved only for the use of students enrolled in the course and only for educational purposes. Course recordings should not be shared outside of the course in any form without express permission.

<u>**GRADING POLICY</u>**: Your final course grade (**Total** in Canvas) will be determined as follows (Extenuating circumstances such as weather-related schedule changes may result in changes to these percentages.):</u>

Unit exams: The three until exams will be taken in the classroom through canvas similarly to your chapter quizzes. They will be timed (for multiple choice or true false usually 1 minute per question, matching or critical thinking multiple choice questions usually 2 minutes per question and usually 5-7 minutes per essay questions). **You will need to download respondus lockdown browser** (link with instructions posted in announcements on canvas) **before you take any of these exams** as it will be required when you are taking the exam. Exam scores will automatically be calculated, except for the essay questions that require manual grading, as soon as you finish your exam. I typically will have all essay questions graded within a week.

Chapter Quizzes: As we finish each chapter, you will have access to a quiz for that chapter on Canvas. Once a quiz has been opened, you will have usually have about a week to complete it. A few days after the quiz is due and before the exam over the quiz content I will make correct answers viewable so you will not miss the same content on your exam as on your quiz. Your lowest quiz grade will be dropped. The quiz average will be calculated as **20%** of the total course grade.

You may take quizzes on campus or at home. Generally, they are limited to a maximum of **1.5 or 2 MINUTES per question.** Therefore, a quiz consisting of **ten questions** will have a total time limit of **fifteen or twenty minutes**. Please note: Canvas will <u>automatically</u> submit your quiz when you reach the time limit. Most quizzes will have **2 chances** to take the quiz and the highest of the two grades will be counted.

Quizzes on Canvas should be taken on a **RELIABLE Internet connection**. If you are knocked offline while taking a **quiz**, I may have to **clear** the quiz before another attempt can be made. Also, be sure to **check the quiz** after submission to make sure that there is a **score**. Email me if you have any sort of quiz problem.

MAP Assignments (Homework and Dynamic Study Modules): You will study (and earn **10%** of your total grade) by completing assignments over each chapter of material in Mastering A&P. You must complete the Homework assignments by the **deadlines** posted on MAP for **full credit**. Dynamic Study Modules CANNOT be completed after the due date, so make sure to get them done early. Homework can be done late, with a 20% penalty.

Letter grades will be assigned according to the following scale, based on the Total in Canvas: A = above 89.5 B = 79.5-89.49 C = 69.5-79.49 D = 59.5-69.49 F = below 59.5

Attendance/ Class Participation: 5% of your grade; Attendance and participation is essential to success in this class. If you miss class it is your responsibility to contact another student (not the instructor) to get notes and other announcements made during class. Your attendance will be recorded by signing an attendance sheet which will be passed out towards the end of every lecture. It is your responsibility to make sure you sign the attendance sheet.

Grade rounding: At the end of the semester, grades will be calculated in Canvas according to the percentages in the syllabus. If your Total grade is within **0.5 points** of the next letter grade, I will **round it up automatically** (see grade scale above). The <u>only</u> other adjustment that will be made is if the final percentage is **WITHIN ONE POINT** of the next letter grade (and NO more), and the student has missed **TWO or less LECTURES**, **TWO or less WEEKLY QUIZZES and has ATTENDED MOST CLASSES or PARTICIPATED ONLINE.** If you meet these criteria, then I will **round up** to the **next letter grade**. (Mitigating circumstances will be taken into account at the discretion of the instructor.)

EXAM/QUIZ MAKE-UP POLICY:

Unfortunately, illnesses, deaths in the family, and other traumatic events are part of life. I understand how difficult these times are, so if you contact me by phone or email within 24 hours of the event and provide **documentation** (letters from family members are NOT acceptable), I will be happy to give you a make-up exam.

If you are unable to take an **exam** as scheduled for some sort of non-emergency issue, then you must let me know well **in ADVANCE**. Students who fail to make timely arrangements will most likely receive a grade of "0" for the exam missed.

Quizzes may be **reposted** for technical issues or other problems at my discretion. I know that stuff happens with work and family, and I am more than willing to work with you as long as you don't make it a habit. However, once the quiz opens in Canvas for review (at **10am on Thursday** each week), taking the quiz is NO LONGER POSSIBLE. Makeup quizzes will NOT be given, since quiz grades will be dropped at the end of the semester.

EXAMINATIONS In Class

Note: LockDown Browser only needs to be installed once per computer or device. It will start automatically from that point forward when a test requires it.

- Before starting the test, know how much time is available for it, and also that you've allotted sufficient time to complete it
- Turn off all mobile devices, phones, etc. and don't have them within reach

- LockDown Browser will prevent you from accessing other websites or applications; you will be unable to exit the test until all questions are completed and submitted

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies:

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with

the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar. Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions that students need to be aware of. These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy:

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date).
