<u>Descripción y metas del curso</u>: Español 4365 es un curso de tipo "survey" que presenta los movimientos y períodos principales de la literatura hispanoamericana desde 1880 junto con algunas de sus figuras más eminentes. Las metas específicas del curso son:

- desarrollar un conocimiento general de la obra de los escritores indicados;
- considerar cuestiones de identidad, poder, lenguaje, historia y destino personal en las obras escogidas;
- brindarle al estudiante la información cultural relevante para la comprensión textual:
- ejercer la crítica literaria y así mejorar las habilidades del estudiante para ella;
- mejorar las destrezas orales y escritas en español del estudiante.

La literatura hispanoamericana ha sido quizás la más sobresaliente de los últimos sesenta años a nivel mundial. Este verano estudiaremos varias de sus manifestaciones durante el siglo XX. Empezaremos con la poesía modernista y después (ya en la primera mitad del siglo XX) seguiremos con la ficción de Horacio Quiroga, Miguel, María Luisa Bombal, Jorge Luis Borges y Juan José Arreola; la poesía de Gabriela Mistral, Alfonsina Storni, Nicolás Guillén y Pablo Neruda. Nuestro recorrido de la segunda mitad del siglo incluye la narrativa de Juan Rulfo, Carlos Fuentes, Julio Cortázar y Gabriel García Márquez; la poesía de Rosario Castellanos; y la ensayística de Octavio Paz. Concluiremos el curso con selecciones de figuras destacadas del "posboom".

Responsabilidades del estudiante: Cada estudiante tendrá que presentar tres (3) exámenes y hacer ejercicios de tarea.

<u>Exámenes y pruebas</u>: Los exámenes serán de respuesta corta con una pregunta de ensayo. <u>Las fechas de las pruebas de lectura se anunciarán en Canvas y en clase</u>.

Tarea: La tarea consistirá en preguntas sobre las lecturas.

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. (For Fall, the Census Date is Sept. 12.) Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar.

Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract.

The Census Date (Sept. 12th) is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

- □Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date).
