REVISED 2323 spring 2024 SYLLABUS

Use this syllabus to plan your homework and to make your appointments for the project. You should always bring hard copies of the assigned texts and the CPAs to class. All work is due at the beginning of class.

Week 1: Getting started, poetry and prosody, the Romantic Period, and the Research Project, appointments with Dr. Ross

In class Jan. 17: Welcome, a poem by Lord Byron, notes on prosody (accents, rhythm, metrical patterns in poetry) and Station to Station Exercise, brief introduction to the Research Project.

Homework: Read William Blake's "Introduction" to Songs of Innocence, "The Lamb", and "The Little Black Boy" these and all other assigned poems are in the Poetry Collection. Do the Class Preparation Assignment—CPA. Mark accents in the first stanza of all three poems. Make appointments with Dr. Ross and Ms. Dubre regarding your research project.

In class Jan. 19: Bring your CPAs to class. Quiz over Blake, discussion using CPAs, plus a metrical exercise. More on the Research Project. Ms. Dubre in class?

Homework: Read Blake's "Introduction" to Songs of Experience, "The Tyger," and "A Poison Tree." Do the CPA, mark the accents in the first stanza of each poem. If you haven't already done so, make appointments with Dr. Ross and Ms. Dubre regarding your research project.

Week 2: Romantic Poetry and prosody, appointments with Dr. Ross, "Yellow Slip" research appointments w/ Ms. Dubre, launch research

In class Jan. 22: Quiz over William Blake's poems to date. More on prosody. Ms. Dubre in class?

Homework: Read Wordsworth's "I wandered lonely as a cloud" and "We are seven," do the CPA, mark the accents in the first stanza of each poem. Build a project plan, using the RUBRIC in this week's module Rubric for creating a Project Plan and notes from meetings with Dr. Ross and Ms. Dubre; start looking for illustrative images, save those to your research plan, begin your bibliography.

In class Jan. 24: Quiz, discussion over Wordsworth's "I wandered lonely as a cloud" and "We are seven." Comments on progress with the Research Project: planning, images, bib.

Homework: Read Coleridge's "Kubla Khan," CPA. Mark the accents in the first stanza. Make progress on your research project: look for images, collect sources, document them correctly, take notes.

In class Jan. 26: Quiz, discussion Coleridge's "Kubla Khan," questions, comments about the research project plans?

Homework: Review notes on prosody, be ready for a quiz. Continue working on the research project, finish your research project plan, include saved images, and any bibliographic references found or used to date. Use the Rubric for Project Planning posted in this module. Rubric for creating a Project Plan

Week 3: Romantic Poetry and prosody. Research underway.

In class Jan. 29: Turn in your research project plan at the beginning of class. Ms. Dubre attends class? Quiz over prosody.

Homework: Do your research: collect sources, document them correctly, take notes.

In class Jan. 31: Introduction to the Lyrical Ballads: "The Rime" and "Tintern Abbey"

Homework: Listen to recording of "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner," there are several on YouTube. Read the text, use the CPA. Mark the accents in the first stanza of the first section and in the first stanza of the third section. Continue with your research: collect sources, document them correctly, take notes.

In class Feb 2: Quiz, discussion over "The Rime,"

Homework: Read and listen to "Tintern Abbey," use the CPA. Mark the accents in the first eight lines. Do your research: collect sources, document them correctly, take notes.

Week 4: Wrap up Romantic poetry and prosody; complete your research bibliography

In class Feb. 5: Quiz, discussion of "Tintern Abbey." Ms. Dubre available in class to guide formatting, online citations, etc.

Homework: Do your research: collect sources, document them correctly, take notes.

In class Feb. 7: Review, discussion of the Romantic Poets, prosody.

Homework: Do your research: collect sources, document them correctly, take notes.

In class Feb. 9: Long Quiz/Short Test on Romantic Poetry, Prosody, and the Research Process.

Homework. Complete your working bibliography for your research project, hand in all progress on your plan—new notes, ideas, images.

Week 5: Victorian Poetry and Research Project

In class Feb. 12: Turn in your working bibliography at the beginning of class. Comments on what the next steps are for the research project. Introduction to Victorian Period, Poetry, and Tennyson.

Homework: Tennyson's "The Lady of Shalott," use the CPA, mark the accents in the first stanza.

In class Feb. 14: Tennyson, quiz and discussion Tennyson's "The Lady of Shalott"

Homework: Tennyson's "Charge of the Light Brigade," use the CPA, mark the accents in the first stanza. Work on your research

In class Feb. 16: Tennyson, quiz discussion "Charge of the Light Brigade"

Homework: Elizabeth Barrett Browning, "Sonnet I: I thought once" and "Sonnet VII: The face of all the world," use the CPA, mark the accents in the first four lines of each poem. Make appointment with the Writing Center.

Week 6: Research and Victorian poetry.

In class Feb. 19: EBB, sonnet form, quiz and discussion "Sonnet I: I thought once" and "Sonnet VII: The face of all the world." Questions, advice on the research projects.

Homework: EBB sonnets: "Sonnet XXI: Say over again", Sonnet XXXII: The first time", and "How do I love thee", use the CPA, mark the accents in the first four lines of each poem. Check in w/ Dr. Ross and Ms. Dubre on your presentations. Work on your research, Writing Center meeting?

In class Feb. 21: Quiz and discussion EBB Sonnet XXI: Say over again," "Sonnet XXXII: The first time," and "How do I love thee?"

Homework: Robert Browning's "My Last Duchess". Work on your research; Writing Center?

In class Feb. 23: Quiz and discussion RB "My Last Duchess"

Homework: Work on your research, final touches. Last chance to get to the Writing Center. Please read Hopkins' "As Kingfishers Catch Fire" and "God's Grandeur"; use the CPA.

Week 7: Wrap up Victorian Poetry and Finish the Research Projects

In class Feb. 26: Quiz and discussion of Hopkins poems

Homework: Finish and turn in your Research Project, entire: all notes, the properly formatted bibliography, and post the file on Canvas discussion board.

In class Feb. 28: Turn in Research projects on Canvas discussion board. Hopkins

Homework: Read and comment on at least four of your classmates' research projects

In class Mar. 1: Discuss research process, products, with Ms. Dubre in class

Homework: Start reading North and South, chapters 1-3, use the first part of the CPA for chapters I-VI.

All of the chapters are covered, but not necessarily in the same groupings as the ones that appear each day for your reading assignment.
