Course Policies

Attendance Policy: Please be on time for class. If you know you are going to be late or absence for/from class, please notify the professor ahead of time. Students with more than three absences are required to complete extra work to make up for the missing oral language participation in class. If you are unable to complete this course, you must withdraw by **November 4th.**

Being in class on time is very important. (arriving late and leaving the classroom early will have negative consequences in your final grade). For students who miss more than six class periods, your participation grade will automatically be reduced to 70%. No exceptions! In Addition, those students will lose the right to complete the extra-credit assignment for makeup work.

It is very important that you arrive at class on time. No exceptions! Those tardies greater than twenty minutes will be penalized. If you accumulate three tardies in a six-day period, those will count as one absence. Same thing if you leave the classroom more than twenty minutes early. After three times you have left the classroom more than twenty minutes

before the class ends, in a six-day period, that will count as an absence as well. Since this is a language course, active participation in listening and speaking is vital, and you must be in the classroom for the whole time that has been established by the educational institution.

CONNECT ASSIGNMENTS

CONNECT is where the digital textbook (online exercises and adaptive learning), and all the assignments are located. This semester we will cover Chapters 1 through 7. There will be a final comprehensive exam from all the chapters very similar to the tests of each chapter. It is embedded in the test for chapter 7.

You are allowed to work on CONNECT EXERCISES as many times as you like. You receive a completion grade. If you have any technical problem, please let **Connect McGraw-Hill** know about it (every section allows you to do this).

NOTE: If you decide to use the 15-day grace period from McGraw-Hill, please make sure to use the same email address when you buy CONNECT. If you do not use the same email, then everything that you may have done in CONNECT will not transfer to CANVAS.

NOTE: All CONNECT EXERCISES are due on the due date, which is the night before we take the exam during the regular class time. Assignments will be graded via McGraw Hill and grades will show in both CANVAS and CONNECT.

CONNECT TESTS

There will be 7 tests for the material covered in CONNECT. The CONNECT tests are in CANVAS. Exams cannot be made up or dropped. No make-up. If for medical or emergency reasons you cannot take a test, I will count the next test twice (I do this only once in the semester). If you miss two or more tests they will count as zeros.

You will take the chapters' exams in the classroom. Only students with some specific accommodation will be allowed to test at the testing center. If you access an exam and then close your browser or abandon the exam without submitting the answers, you will get a zero for that exam and you will not be able to retake it. YOU MUST NOT ACCESS ANY EXAM MORE THAN ONCE UNDER ANY CIRCUMSTANCES, unless there is a technical issue with the McGraw-Hill Connect platform.

You are expected to complete all the exams without using the textbook or assistance from anybody or from any source. Scholastic dishonesty is an unacceptable mode of

The final exam will be comprehensive from all the seven chapters. It will be embedded in the test for chapter seven. The questions are very similar to the questions from previous chapters.

The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to meet all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has yet to be assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F, or NC. If the course was initially taken under the CR/NC grading basis, this may adversely affect the student's academic standing.
