

FREN 2611: Intensive French II (Online) SPRING 2025

Course Description

Designed for students who have completed at least 6 hours of French or have equivalent competence in French. This course is accelerated and intended to reinforce the material learned in previous French courses. We will review all of the French grammar seen during the first year of French and build up vocabulary, conversation, reading, and writing skills. You will expand proficiency through coursework, homework, and practice using the target language. You will further develop a deeper understanding of the diverse aspects of societies and cultures in the Francophone world.

Course Structure

This course is 100% online. It has a 16-week structure with five Unit Modules. Each module has multiple lessons and assignments.

Expected Outcomes

By the end of the course, students should understand the main ideas of what they hear, see, and read in French. They should also be able to interact successfully on an intermediate level in both oral and written contexts. In addition to these linguistic skills, students should have a deeper understanding of the diverse aspects of societies and cultures in francophone areas of the world.

Upon successful completion of this course, learners should be able to accomplish a variety of communicative tasks, including:

<u>Reading</u>: Understand texts that consist mainly of high-frequency everyday language. Understand the description of events, feelings, and wishes.

<u>Writing</u>: Write clear and detailed texts to defend their point of view on many subjects, describing experiences and impressions.

<u>Listening</u>: Understand the main points of clear standard speech on familiar matters encountered in school, restaurants, leisure, doctor visits, vacations, etc.

<u>Spoken interaction:</u> Deal with most situations likely to arise while traveling in an area where French is spoken. They can enter unprepared into conversation on familiar topics.

<u>Spoken production:</u> Connect phrases to describe experiences/events and their dreams, hopes, and ambitions. They can briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.

Materials

- Required textbook: Horizons. 7th edition, 2019, Cengage. (E-Book and MindTap digital learning platform)
- Students will be asked to watch three French movies throughout the semester. Only movies 1 and 2 can be viewed online for free.

Minimum Technology Requirements and required skills

This course has digital components. To fully participate, students need a working computer with a speaker and webcam to reliably access the Internet and view content videos on Canvas or YouTube. Students should also demonstrate proficiency using Canvas and Cengage MindTap (see MindTap - Getting Started Video in Canvas).

MindTap Assignments: Students will complete short assignments via MindTap (Cengage). Learning a foreign language requires constant practice. MindTap will guide students through the course materials and position them to make the most of the instruction and interactions, similar to how they would during class meetings.

Discussion Forums: Students will watch videos, read short paragraphs from our textbook related to world cultures and societies where French is spoken, and answer questions. After their initial response, students will engage in the discussion by asking questions or adding comments to their classmates' posts. The discussion will be in English and French, using complete sentences with substantive contributions and accurate information. The discussion assignments are designed to keep students connected.

Reading Comprehension: Reading is critical to learning a foreign language. Throughout the semester, students will be asked to read authentic documents in French and answer questions adapted to the curriculum level in English and French.

Module Reviews: At the end of each module, students will complete a chapter review (multiple-choice assignment), mainly covering the chapter's grammar and vocabulary points.

Module quizzes: Each module will include quizzes on reading/listening comprehension, grammar, conjugations, vocabulary, and writing. Students must complete the module reviews before starting the quizzes. Each quiz is timed, and students have only one attempt, so they should be well-prepared before starting.

Recording: Students will turn in all their recordings on Canvas. Students must have a computer with a camera. The recording is submitted using Media Recording, which is directly recorded in Canvas with the camera on. A recording submitted without a camera will result in a grade of zero. The recordings will help students with their pronunciation and allow me to provide constructive feedback.

Oral Presentation: Three times this semester, students will record themselves speaking a few minutes about a specific topic in French. They should make eye contact with the audience (look at their camera) and avoid reading off notes. Students must memorize their speech, use complete sentences, and demonstrate the correct use of conjugation tenses and vocabulary learned.

Movie exercises: This semester, students will watch three different French movie genres. Each Movie will have two exercises (*Avant le film* and *Après le film*). These movies aim to provide a cultural education that enriches language comprehension by showing a more natural form of the language with authentic vocabulary and slang.

Final Exam: Students will take their final exam during the last week of the semester and have the entire week to complete it. The exam is comprehensive and covers chapters 7, 8, 9, and 10.

Assignment Policy

All homework assignments are due online through Canvas. Assessments have been organized to follow a pattern and facilitate planning and organization. Students are responsible for checking due dates and completing assignments on time. To successfully complete the assignments, you must carefully manage your time. Please plan to complete them well ahead of the due date.

At the end of the semester, I will drop the following grades (via Canvas Gradebook function):

- The lowest (1) recording score
- The lowest three (3) scores of Module Activities
- The lowest three (3) scores of Module quizzes
- The nine (9) lowest grades of the MindTap assignments

Late Work

Due dates are expected to be followed to allow you to complete the course on time. As such, I generally do not accept late work. However, if exceptional circumstances happen, please contact me as soon as possible.

Instructor Responsibilities and Feedback

My goal in this course is to provide an environment conducive to your learning. I will be available during office hours via Zoom. I welcome questions about any part of the course and will gladly clarify any issues. Most homework assignments are automatically graded. I prioritize grading quizzes, but my experience suggests it can take up to a week to get them back to you.

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. (For Fall, the Census Date is Sept. 12.) Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar.

Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract.

The Census Date (Sept. 1) is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

• Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.

- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date).
