ENGL 5310, Literary Masterpieces—Milton's Paradise Lost

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Recommended Text: Paradise Lost: A Norton Critical Edition, ed. Gordon Teskey, 3rd revised edition, ISBN: 978-0393924282. An online version will also be provided for free.

Aim of Course: In this course, we will delve into the poetic genius of John Milton and read his masterpiece, Paradise Lost. His depiction of Satan, God, and our progenitors, Adam and Eve, define Western thought's perception of these beings so much so that people often confuse the text's portrayal Satan's temptation of Eve with that of the Bible. In fact, the seduction only occupies seven verses in the Book of Genesis whereas Milton dedicates roughly a thousand lines to this event. Our interpretation and explanation of these characters will illuminate their religious, philosophical and literary import. In pursuit of this goal, we will examine their interaction with one another and employ various critical approaches to assess their line of reasoning and notion of what defines happiness.

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. read, analyze, and interpret a number of passages in light of the text's dominant themes.
- 2. demonstrate an awareness of the cultural or historical significance of the texts.
- 3. explain how literary genres determine a text's construction.
- 4. synthesize a detailed knowledge of how this literary work belongs to a specific time period.

The grade will be based upon four three-page papers, an annotated bibliography for each paper, and five weekly responses posted on Discussion Board. When writing the papers, you must follow the structure posted on Canvas entitled, "Writing Structure for Literary Arguments." Review the grading rubrics posted on the "Getting Started" section of Canvas in order to understand how best to complete the assigned tasks. If any changes are necessary to make on this syllabus, you will be notified through e-mail on your Canvas account.

Topics such as religion, sex, and politics are fundamental in literary studies and, thus, will be examined in detail in this course.

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies:

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at

http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar.

Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract.

The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions that students need to be aware of. These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for nonpayment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date). Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance.
