Welcome

This course is the second in the sequence of two Choral Literature studies that present a broad survey of historic and new choral literature in the practical context of concert programming. This course also includes instruction on choral music sources, performance practice and related conducting issues, music librarianship and other music administration related concepts unique to a choral ensemble.

Course Scope & Objectives

Upon successfully completing this course the student should be able to:

- Categorize and summarize characteristics of historic forms, genres, composers and styles of choral music.
- 2. Design creative choral concert programs with specific artistic and practical criteria.
- 3. Demonstrate a working knowledge of research techniques and sources for finding quality choral literature.
- 4. Demonstrate knowledge of publishers of choral music and the characteristics of their respective catalogues.
- 5. Demonstrate the ability to manage a choral library.

Course Activities

- 1. Attendance (15% of final grade). This course is participatory in nature and class members are expected to attend all scheduled class meetings. - 2. Portfolio Projects 65% of final grade). Weekly research and concert programming projects for various choral forms and composers will be assigned, with class members presenting their findings and programs in class. - 3. Midterm Project (10% of final grade). This will consist of concert programming or other topics researched and presented in class this semester. Details given in the assignment.
