Course Overview:

Students in this course will rehearse and perform in a flute choir. Repertoire is selected based on ability levels of those enrolled. There will be one 1-hour rehearsal each week (Friday 1:30-2:30). New students will audition for the instructor at the first meeting to determine part assignments.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- Study and perform flute ensemble repertoire in a variety of styles.
- Develop collaboration and rehearsal skills based on aural awareness, musicianship, and communication.
- Develop and build on intonation, articulation, and rhythmic skills in a group setting.

Required Textbooks and Materials:

- Flute in good repair, cleaning and maintenance materials.
- Concert attire (all black)
- Music (distributed in class)

Concerts

There will be one concert at the end of the semester. Additional performances may be added with 4 weeks notice.

Attendance Policy:

Students must attend all scheduled rehearsals. If the student needs to miss rehearsal, they must email the instructor prior to the day of the lessons. Absences will be excused for illness, family emergencies, and other circumstances outside of student control. Unexcused absences (no call/no show) will result in a lower grade.

Tardiness of more than 5 minutes will result in a 0 for attendance that day, but will be eligible for the full participation grade.
