Welcome

This course is designed to introduce you to the process of studying "classical" music, and to provide a one-semester overview of the development of western classical music from the the Middle Ages to the modern era. This course also fulfills the university Core Curriculum requirement in Creative Arts for all majors outside of music.

Course Scope & Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, you should be able to:

1. Identify major composers, representative musical works, genres and general style characteristics for each period of western music history.
2. Understand the relationship between societal, cultural and musical developments throughout history.
3. Write knowledgeably about various musical styles and historical periods in the context of listening to representative works.

Required Course Materials

A notebook, a good pen and consistent internet.

Class Format & Pacing

This course will be taught online using Canvas modules and multi-media streams. While this class is 'asynchronous,' that is, not a live stream, I have worked to write modules and find examples that I think you will find engaging, thought-provoking and fun. Please progress through the course modules in a consistent, regular way. I have provided start dates and links to each module below and in the Canvas calendar with which I highly recommend you keep up. You are free to progress through this course as quickly as you like, but please avoid falling behind.

Tests

There are six Canvas tests in this course covering the major periods of Western music history. Each test is comprised of multiple choice questions and music listening examples. All tests are active at the start of the term, but each test has a strict due date after which it will no longer be available. This is to help keep you progressing through the course at a steady pace.

At an in-person class you must be present on one the day and time a test is given. **Since all the tests in this course are available starting on the first day of class, and all test deadlines are published ahead of time, there are no test make-ups, extensions or extra-credit for missing a test deadline.** Please record all test due dates in your calendar and avoid waiting until the last minute to take them in the event you run into an unforeseen issue. **Missing a test will reduce your final grade by approximately 13%.**

I recommend taking your tests in a campus computer lab if possible. If you experience a computer or internet problem there, staff can assist you or they may contact me. If you have an internet or computer issue while taking a test while off campus, I will be unable to resolve it.

With the exception of your short essays (below), all tests are to be taken without any type of assistance other than your memory. This includes, but is not limited to: using notes, books, websites, apps, Canvas modules, or collaborating with others.

Throughout this course you should be thinking about the question, "What is Music?" Your thoughts will develop and expand with each historic period and composer you will study. At the end of some modules you will be asked

AI, Plagiarism, Cheating

- Copying words or ideas from someone else without giving credit
- Failing to put a quotation in quotation marks
- Giving incorrect information about the source of a quotation
- Changing words but copying the sentence structure of a source without giving credit
- Copying so many words or ideas from a source that it makes up the majority of your work, whether you give credit or not

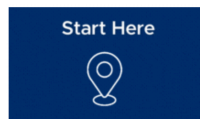

Incomplete Grade Policy

If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in place of a grade only when all of

exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor, and (c) the student presents these reasons before the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average. The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to meet all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If the course was initially taken under the CR/NC grading basis, this may adversely affect the student's academic standing.

Grade Appeal Policy

The student should provide the rationale for the grade appeal and attach supporting document about the grades earned. The form should be sent via email to the faculty member who assigned the grade.
