



Introductory Texas Politics

POLS 2306 – Fall 2024

Syllabus

Course Description:

This course offers a survey of contemporary government and politics in the State of Texas. It will examine political development in Texas with special attention to its context, institutions, and the electoral process. Furthermore, this course will emphasize the theoretical and practical understanding of how and why the Texas political system produces the kind of policies it does, and how the system itself is structured.

Learning Outcomes:

After successfully completing this course, students should be able to:

- Explain the origin and development of the Texas constitution.
- Describe state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of Texas government.
- Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
- Analyze state and local election processes.
- Analyze issues, policies, and the political culture of Texas.

The textbook is a free PDF (*Uncovering Texas Politics*) in Canvas. There is no official textbook for you to purchase.

Course Structure:

This course will be conducted in three units and there will be one exam and three quizzes on the material in each unit. All units will be available for a limited period, and you may work through them at your own pace as long as you complete all required quizzes for each unit before the exam for that unit takes place. The units will close (i.e. no longer be available) at the end of the unit exam. Check Canvas for due dates.

You are expected to log on each week and complete the work and take the quiz in the current module. Waiting until the last minute to do the assignments is not advised. Having a computer issue, internet issue, Canvas issue, or any other issue at the end of the day that assignments are due is not an excuse for not completing them, and no additional time will be granted. If you do the work early and an issue presents itself, then there is time for us to work together and resolve it so that you can submit the work by the due date.

Online Reading Quizzes: Each reading quiz will consist of 10 multiple choice/true-false questions derived from the text. This will assess how well you are reading the chapters and digesting the information. Reading quizzes will be worth 10 points per quiz and cannot be made up unless there are extenuating circumstances. You will have 30 minutes to complete a quiz, and the quizzes will open Mondays at 12:01 am and close Fridays at 11:59 pm the week they are due.

Online Writing Assignment: You will have to write one essay this semester related to a question posted in Canvas. The essay is worth 20 points, and no-makeup is offered. The assignment details are in Canvas and the essay is due November 22, 2024.

Online Exams:

There will be three-unit exams and an optional final. Each exam will consist of a mixture of multiple choice, true/false, and short answer questions for a total of 100 points. You will have 90 minutes to complete a unit exam, and the exam will open Mondays at 12:01 am and close Fridays at 11:59 pm the week it is due.

The optional final will be cumulative and only include multiple choice questions. The optional final can be used to make up for a unit exam you missed or a grade you did not like.

All exams are taken online in Canvas and no lockdown browser or proctoring software is required.
