Introduction

This course examines the American politics at the mass media level, with an emphasis on communication, opinion, behavior, and culture. Topics include mass media in political campaigns, the influence of popular culture on public opinion and political behavior, as well as the electoral and governing strategies of political communication.

Course Objectives

- 1. Develop a critical understanding of the role of mass media in American political discourse.
- 2. Examine how political actors use media to influence the public.

Attendance Policy

Attendance is mandatory. I will take attendance. You will receive an attendance score. It is not my favorite thing in the world to do, but it keeps you accountable. If you will be (or were) absent for any legitimate reason, please contact me in a timely fashion (which means don't wait until the end of the semester). I'm fairly lenient when you keep me informed.

Repeated tardiness is unacceptable. Repeated tardiness will result in a lessened attendance score.

Polling Participation Assignment

This assignment reflects a service learning activity to create real-world experience in the application of social science research and the skills you will be able to provide upon graduation. As part of this class you will be trained to conduct telephone surveys by entering detailed information from each respondent into Computer Assisted Telephone Interview (CATI) software. You will be trained on how to conduct surveys in-person in the Polling Lab and be led by survey professionals and faculty.

My goal will be to teach you the nuts and bolts of conducting a statewide survey and what to be mindful of as you ask questions to a respondent. You will see how details are collected and then compiled into a larger

database to include the research of you and your peers.

The training will be complete upon passage of a Canvas-based proficiency quiz. Note: points will be deducted for each round that it takes to achieve mastery of each task.

The poll you will assist in conducting will be in the field for two weeks, with the Polling Lab open for operation in the evenings between 5pm and 8:30pm on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, as well as a block of time from 1pm to 5pm on Saturdays and Sundays. You will be able to select shifts to work at one of the 20 stations during that time.

The following are key to your participation grade:

• The University of Texas at Tyler, requires certified researches to complete 9 units of research and ethics training. The certification is given by the Institutional Review Board. The professional training is provided by CITI.

Assignment:

- 1. Visit the link to the CITI Training and register an account using your @patriots.uttyler.edu email address.
 - You will select your organization affiliation by typing --> University of Texas at Tyler.
 - You can make your own username and password.
- 2. Complete the 9 units, they will require passing a quiz at each step.
- 3. Upload your completion record to Canvas by entering the url for your record.
 - I was able to do this by clicking the "View-Print-Share" link on my account's page. I then scrolled to the bottom and selected the last link (found after "To Share the Completion Certificate...").
- Your participation will be assessed based on the hours you work (**minimum 8 hours**). The quality of your participation will reflect a ratio of the quality of your participation that reflects the number of calls made and the number of calls successfully completed. You will also be evaluated through observation of how clearly you communicate with respondents and complete the assigned tasks.
- You will also be asked to journal (minimum of <u>3 pages</u>) your experiences, offering a daily reflection on the similarities and differences of respondent attitudes recorded during the surveys you completed. What combinations of views were unexpected? What is your assessment of the political knowledge of respondents you spoke with? What messages from the media or campaigns are being reflected back in the answers of the individuals you spoke with?

Upon submission of this daily journal of your polling experience add an introduction of the main themes you recognized and a conclusion about the value of these reflections as evidence of the larger themes you recognized. In your conclusion, you may also want to add reflections about topics respondents wanted to talk about beyond the survey and offer advice on how the next survey could address those concerns.

Midterm Exam

This exam will be held on Thursday, March 5, 2020.

Final Exam

This exam will be held on Thursday, April 23, 2020.

Note - If you miss an exam, you *must* have one of the following: A) a note from a doctor proving you were too ill on the day of the exam to take it. Be aware that receipts from the Student Health Center are not sufficient documentation of a serious illness; or B) a copy of an obituary, in the unfortunate case you have to attend a funeral; C) proof of extremely prohibitive circumstances (such as being in an auto accident on the way to campus or a family emergency). The make-up exam you take will be different from the exam taken by the rest of the class and may include essay questions. No other excuses will be accepted for a missed exam. If an exam is missed, the student will receive a grade of *zero*, and (unlike a summer in Texas) that ain't going to be too hot.

Note – I will *not* be offering "extra credit" opportunities.

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. (For Fall, the Census Date is Sept. 12.) Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contractitself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar. Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract.

The Census Date (Sept. 12th) is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid State-Mandated Course

Drop Policy

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the

specific date). Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance. Please contact the Enrollment Services Center if you have any questions.
