COURSE CATALOG DESCRIPTION

CRIJ-1301, Introduction to Criminal Justice. This course provides a historical and philosophical overview of the American criminal justice system, including the nature, extent, and impact of crime; criminal law; and justice agencies and processes.

COURSE RATIONALE

This course analyzes the basic structure, functions, and relationships of the components of the criminal justice system (i.e., police, courts, corrections). Current issues in criminal justice are emphasized.





TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS

Students must have access to a computer or tablet with internet access to use UT-Tyler's Canvas LMS. Your grades and some assignments will be handled through Canvas. **Students are also required to bring with them to class a #2 pencil for use on SCANTRON forms.**

<u>ATTENDANCE</u>

You can't learn if you're not in class. **Attendance in this class is mandatory.** University courses are about learning a wealth of material in a short period of time - with the goal of being able to think critically about the topics at hand. As such, attendance at lecture will greatly increase your ability to understand the field of criminal justice. Additionally, attendance will improve your grades. You will be allowed two unexcused absences. **Each unexcused absence above the two "freebies" permitted will lower your final course grade by one point.** Because this is a traditional, face-to-face course, you may **not** attend via Zoom. You must by **physically** present in order to get credit.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

- Anti-Plagiarism Certificate: You must complete the free, online anti-plagiarism course from the School of Education at Indiana University Bloomington. Upon completion of the IU course, you must earn at least 90% on the course's exam and upload a copy of your completion certificate to Canvas. This certificate is worth 5% of your grade.
- Quizzes: A large portion of your grade (30%) will be based on quiz scores. You have two types of
 quizzes over the semester: "pop" quizzes given in class and longer, more detailed chapter quizzes
 given via Canvas. The in-class quizzes will be given via SCANTRON and you're not permitted to
 use your book or your notes. The longer, chapter quizzes on Canvas are more in-depth, so you
 are permitted to use your book, your notes, any handouts, etc.
- Unit Exams: You will have three major exams. The exams will come at the end of each unit and will be given via SCANTRON in class. You are not permitted to use your book or your notes on these exams. Unit exams make up 30% of your overall grade.
- Assignments: You will have several assignments (e.g., a case brief over Mapp v Ohio) this semester. These assignments are to be submitted via Canvas. These assignments make up 20% of your overall grade. Any written assignment will be checked via Turnitin to ensure there has been no plagiarism.
- **Final Exam**: You will have a comprehensive final exam at the end of class. The final exam will be given via SCANTRON and will be completed in the classroom. You are not permitted to use your book or your notes on the final. The final makes up 15% of your overall grade.

Policy on Late Work or Missed Quizzes/Exams

It is the student's responsibility to keep track of due dates. Please note that quizzes, assignments, and tests must be completed on the listed due date; missing quizzes, assignments, or tests will translate into a score of zero for that particular assignment. Barring any significant extenuating circumstances (e.g., a giant snow storm that closes down campus), there will be no makeups given for missed work or quizzes/exams. PLEASE submit your work on time.
