This course serves as a prerequisite to CRIJ 4313, Advanced Correctional Systems and Practices.

The course curriculum provides an historical, structural, and operational overview of the American correctional system. Topics covered will help you to grasp the immense complexities of corrections in modern America.

Upon successful completion of this course, you will be able to:


- Describe the organization and operation of correctional systems and alternatives to institutionalization.



- Unit Exams: There are exams at the end of each major unit. The exams will be based on the material from the unit covered. Questions on the exam will be multiple choice or true/false. Studying your quizzes will make a HUGE difference in how well you do on the exams. Exams will be given using SCANTRON forms and will be taken during class. There are no makeup dates for missed exams.
- **Final Exam**: The final exam will cover all of the material you've learned over the course of the semester. Studying your quizzes and unit exams will make a HUGE difference in how well you do on the final. Questions on the exam will be multiple choice or true/false. The final exam will be given using SCANTRON forms and will be taken during class. There are no makeup dates for a missed exam.
