Course Information

This course explores the impact of 9/11 on law enforcement organizations and criminal justice agencies in the United States and examines the linked relationship between local, state, and federal law enforcement with the military and homeland security organizations. Students will also focus on terrorism-related issues including the motivations and actions taken by trans-national terrorist groups around the world. There is a strong emphasis on understanding how the broader impacts of homeland security issues at the national level and how they trickle down to the local law enforcement communities. *This course serves as a continuation of CRIJ-4333 Contemporary Policing and should be taken second in the sequence.*

Course Rationale

This course will answer the "who, what, when, where, and why" questions you've always had about homeland security ("HLS") and terrorism in the modern era. The course curriculum provides you with a background in what HLS and terrorism are, the changes brought about by the 9/11 attacks, our nation's response to threats, and the ways HLS and terrorism have an impact on our modern way of life in the USA.


Student Learning Outcomes



This is a senior-level university course, so your grammar, word choice, punctuation, spelling, etc., will all factor into your grade. Your response(s) must demonstrate to me that you've read the material and that you understand it.
- Unit Exams: There are exams at the end of each major unit. The exams will be based on the material from the unit covered. Studying your quizzes will make a HUGE difference in how well you do on the exams. You may take each exam only once; the exam will be timed; and exams will not be accepted after the posted due date (11:59p on Sunday night of the day it's due). Questions on the exams will be multiple choice or true/false.
- **Final Exam**: The final exam will cover all of the material you've learned over the course of the semester. Studying your quizzes and unit exams will make a HUGE difference in how well you do on the final. You may take the final exam only once; the exam will be timed; and the exams will not be accepted after the posted due date of finals week. Questions on the exam will be multiple choice or true/false.
