Course Description

This course is the first course in the two course methods/statistics sequence. In this course, students will learn the basic research methods and statistical analyses commonly used in social science research. During the semester, students will learn fundamentals of the scientific method and scientific inquiry, ethical considerations in research, and quantitative data collection methods.

Students will also be introduced to IBM SPSS statistical software and basic univariate and bivariate statistics.

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

To encourage mastery, you will have the opportunity to revise and resubmit lab exercises one time each semester.

Exams

Instead of traditional exams, each semester includes an Article Analysis assignment. This assignment requires you to analyze and critique a published research article in an essay-style response. You will have one full calendar week to complete the Article Analysis assignment.



Research Proposal Project

The Research Proposal Project is a cumulative course project that will be completed **over the course of the full year in 5396/5397.** The goal of the proposal is to develop a feasible research study that can be implemented in your Capstone Seminar course. The final proposal will include a 10-page proposal, your data collection instrument, and a completed IRB application.

The Research Proposal Project is designed to help you practice the steps necessary to begin a research study in the real world. For that reason, proposals must be feasible and take into account the project's budget and personnel constraints.



Project Timeline

The Research Proposal Project is a continuous project that will span both the Fall and Spring semesters.

Fall semester

During the **Fall** semester, you will brainstorm your research proposal through a series of discussion board assignments. These discussions allow you to refine your ideas using feedback from me and your classmates. You will also attend a research consultation with the Social Science Librarian. At the end of the Fall semester, you will submit a Research Proposal **Draft**.

Spring semester

In the Spring semester, you will finalize your Research Proposal through feedback and a writing consultation with the UT Tyler Writing Center. The Final Research Proposal will be submitted during Module 14 of the Spring semester.



Grade Replacement / Forgiveness and Census Date Policies

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services

at http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the $\overline{\textit{Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published each semester by the \textit{Office of the Registrar.}}$ Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three-course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract.

The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

- 1. Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- 2. Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- 3. Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- 4. Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- 5. Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid

State-Mandated Course Drop Policy

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date).
