**Course Overview:** This class utilizes a service-learning experience in an international setting to introduce students to international social work practice and a range of global social issues that shape human welfare and social development. This course requires acceptance into the Alternative Spring Break program along with international travel during UTT's scheduled spring break. The course content will reflect the Council on Social Work Education's (CSWE) requirements for accreditation.

Course Overview: The purpose of this course is to introduce students to international social welfare in less-developed countries (LDCs). Students are members of a broader society dependent on their meaningful contributions for its success. In an increasingly global and more complex world, we require creative solutions. This course will provide an integrated, coherent learning experience to prepare students for responsible inquiry and action. Students will also engage in service-learning opportunities where they will be working as a team to serve various community agencies. Projects will be a mixture of labor intensive and interpersonal engagement with various populations including children, older adults, and community development programs.

# Required Textbook and readings:

No textbook required. Class readings will be provided by professor each week.

# **Descriptions of Major Assignments and Examinations:**

Grades will be assigned on a letter grade basis for participation in the pre-travel requirements, writing assignments, and Programming provided to partner agencies while traveling abroad. The following assignments are required:

- 1. Substantive Training: Participation in pre-travel orientation/training sessions and one post-travel integration session.
- 2. Participation in group and individual activities with the agency's client population
- 3. Weekly pre-trip preparation assignments (5 total)
- **4.** Completion of a 4–5-page reflective paper (DUE: by 4/5 at 11:59 p.m.)

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All written assignments must be grammatically correct using APA style. Assignments with many grammatical errors, misspellings, and/or evidence of plagiarism will not receive a satisfactory grade. All written assignments will be due on the date listed on the course schedule. Ten points will be deducted for late assignments. No assignment will be accepted after five days late.

A grade of incomplete will not be given for this class.

#### Make-Up Exams:

Late assignments (including exams) are strongly discouraged. There will be 10 points (total) deducted for each late assignment and exam. No assignment or exam will be accepted after 5 days following the due date. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that his/her work is completed on time and submitted correctly.

#### **Expectations for Out-of-Class Study:**

Beyond the time required to travel over Spring Break, students enrolled in this course should expect to spend at least an additional <u>8</u> hours pre-trip instruction hours (4 class sessions) preparing for the

trip and developing programming for the partner agency presentations while in Costa Rica. 2 additional hours (1 class session) will be spent meeting post-trip to debrief and reflect.

#### **Attendance:**

Engaged and timely participation in all pre and post trip meetings constitutes "attendance" for purposes of this course. Meeting times will be discussed and zoom options will be offered on an as needed basis only.

# **Reflection Paper**

Provide a 4–5-page reflection in the form of a structured journal entry (i.e. with subheadings) addressing:

# Topic 1:

How your experiences in Costa Rica matched your expectations. Were you reasonably prepared for the cultural context? Were you reasonably prepared for the services you were asked to provide? What, if any, aspects of the experience surprised you?

#### Topic 2:

What you learned about Costa Rican culture as related to social service needs and responses? What, if anything, did you observe about the acceptance or stigmatization of client populations in Costa Rica? Thinking of the discussions at our culminating community symposium, what did you learn about the readiness of Grenadians to respond to local needs, and the obstacles they face in doing so?

#### Topic 3:

How, if at all, has this experience influenced your thinking about social work and your future career? Will you do or see anything differently based on this experience? Would you recommend it to others?

What would have made it a better experience for you?

# **Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies**

Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at <a href="http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar">http://www.uttyler.edu/registrar</a>. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information

pamphlets published each semester by the Office of the Registrar.

Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract.

The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware. These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waiver through Financial Aid State-Mandated

# **Course Drop Policy**

Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date).

Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance. Please contact the Enrollment Services Center if you have any questions.

  - divulging the contents of an examination, for the purpose of preserving questions for use by another, when the instructors has designated that the examination is not to be removed from the examination room or not to be returned or to be kept by the student;
  - substituting for another person, or permitting another person to substitute for oneself to take a course, a test, or any course-related assignment;
  - paying or offering money or other valuable thing to, or coercing another person to obtain an unadministered test, test key, homework solution, or computer program or information about an unadministered test, test key, home solution or computer program;
  - falsifying research data, laboratory reports, and/or other academic work offered for credit;
  - taking, keeping, misplacing, or damaging the property of The University of Texas at Tyler, or of another, if the student knows or reasonably should know that an unfair academic advantage would be gained by such conduct; and
