Course Textbook Required Text: Required textbook: Organizational Behavior, 19th edition – 2023, Authors: Robbins and Judge, Publisher: Pearson. You may use an ebook or printed edition, whatever works best for you.

Course Description

An understanding of the management history and functions of planning, organizing, leading, and controlling. The role of a manager is examined in promoting change and providing effective leadership, motivation, team building, communication and decision making.

The student course learning outcomes are to:

- 1. Understand management history, concepts, and the functions of planning, organizing, leading, and controlling.
- 2. Explain organizational culture and its impact on managing people.
- 3. Compare and contrast different organizational designs and structures.
- 4. Recognize the role of management in communication and motivation in organizations.
- 5. Interpret and analyze leadership theory as related to individual, group, and team behavior.
- 6. Explain the role of management in promoting change, diversity, globalization, and ethics in decision making.
- 7. Cite all sources used in your class work correctly using APA style.

Meeting this objective will ensure that:

- 1) it is clear what thoughts and ideas in your work are the results of your own thinking and
- 2) readers can use your citations to find/review the original sources of ideas and there will be no plagiarism in your class submissions.

Course Organization & Major Activities

Course activities will vary weekly based on the material. Typical course materials and activities will include:

- 1) Text readings.
- 2) PowerPoint voice over lectures may be added for some topics
- 2) Supplemental Articles and Videos. Most weeks you will need to read supplemental articles and/or watch videos to supplement material from the text. The articles/videos will be posted on CANVAS in the corresponding modules.
- 3) Chapter Quizzes
 - Quiz questions will be drawn from your textbook and supplemental reading assignments. Each Quiz will consist of 10(ish) multiple-choice questions.
 - Quizzes are opened as they are created so that you may work at your own pace (one of the benefits of an asynchronous online class!) However, they are due during the week they are assigned. Students will have no less than 7 days to complete each Quiz.
 - Quizzes will be taken via CANVAS Quizzes. Lockdown Browser is not required. Quizzes are not open book or open notes and should be completed on your own without

- aid from others. Using these or any other resources during a test will be considered cheating and will be referred to the appropriate University officials.
- Quizzes will be timed, so once you begin, you must take the quiz in its entirety. You will see one question at a time and will not be able to go back once you answer a question. Please manage your time carefully. You will have 20 minutes for each exam.

3) Article Reviews

• Each module will require a topical article review from a business publication. The article review will be a minimum of 350 words. Additional instructions will be found in Canvas.

4) Group Project

• Each student will work with a group to complete a book review project of 8-10 pages. Additional instructions will be found in Canvas.

IMPORTANT Course Information

Student To Dos: Will be used to introduce each module and topics. Be sure to read these and complete the activities assigned.

Announcements: Will be used as needed to alert you to items outside of our regular weekly Student To Do communications. All announcements will be posted through CANVAS.

Email and CANVAS Inbox: Your Patriot email and CANVAS Inbox will be used for class-related communication. Please check them regularly. Use these methods to communicate with me. Using your personal email may result in your communications being flagged as SPAM and being deleted.

Regular CANVAS logins: Because this is an online course, you must regularly log on to CANVAS to be current on all course assignments as well as regularly check your UT Tyler email account for any important course-related announcements. Visiting the CANVAS course page at least 3-4 times a week is appropriate, especially given the group assignments and discussion assignments. If you do not participate in an assignment (group or individual), you will receive zero points for that exercise.

This class is classified as an Asynchronous/Online class. We will not plan to meet live as a class, however I'm happy to schedule time to meet with your groups or meet with you individually. You just need to ask.

You will be required to complete a significant amount of work online, individually and in groups. It is your responsibility to ensure you are able meet with and work with your group. Failure to participate in group work will result in reduced credit. A detailed outline of our classes and expectations is below.

You are expected to complete all the activities in each module as they are due. You may work ahead as the course postings allow, but all work must be completed by the deadline. Completing these activities will require that you regularly log into CANVAS. Failure to do so will negatively affect your course grade.

Late Work/Make Up Work

Make up exams and late work will be considered on a case-by-case basis and will follow University guidelines. Students are expected to submit exams and assignments on time. Exceptions should only occur because of the most extenuating circumstances.

Grading Policy

Grades will be posted to the CANVAS gradebook. You can access your grades by entering the CANVAS course and selecting "Grades" from the course menu. Online exams will be graded immediately. Feedback on individual and group assignments may be expected within approximately 7 business days of the due date.

Other Requirements

In addition to the textbook and technology requirements, you must also have schedule availability to complete the course work within the required deadlines and have availability to work with your classmates on group projects.

Netiquette

Since we will conduct work online, "Netiquette" is super important. In a diverse class, humor and sarcasm may not translate online or in different cultures. I want you to be yourself and have some fun in this class, but you must also be polite and respectful in your postings (no "Flaming" or posting /sending negative, hurtful comments to others); use good grammar and correct spelling; don't write in all caps (it feels like you're shouting) or exotic fonts (they may not show up on everyone's computer). In short, present your best self! Nice matters.

Grade Replacement/Forgiveness and Census Date Policies Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade Replacement Contracts are available in the Enrollment Services Center or at http://www.uttyler.edu/registrarLinks to an external site. Each semester's Census Date can be found on the Contract itself, on the Academic Calendar, or in the information pamphlets published

each semester by the Office of the Registrar. Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average.

Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Full policy details are printed on each Grade Replacement Contract. The Census Date is the deadline for many forms and enrollment actions of which students need to be aware.

These include:

- Submitting Grade Replacement Contracts, Transient Forms, requests to withhold directory information, approvals for taking courses as Audit, Pass/Fail or Credit/No Credit.
- · Receiving 100% refunds for partial withdrawals. (There is no refund for these after the Census Date)
- Schedule adjustments (section changes, adding a new class, dropping without a "W" grade)
- · Being reinstated or re-enrolled in classes after being dropped for non-payment
- Completing the process for tuition exemptions or waivers through Financial Aid State-Mandated Course Drop Policy Texas law prohibits a student who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at another 2-year or 4-year Texas public college or university. For purposes of this rule, a dropped course is any course that is dropped after the census date (See Academic Calendar for the specific date). Exceptions to the 6-drop rule may be found in the catalog. Petitions for exemptions must be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center and must be accompanied by documentation of the extenuating circumstance.
