Course Description

An in-depth investigation into contemporary literature and case studies of advanced concepts in organizational leadership, learning and change. Students will create and design advanced learning organizations in order to facilitate the change necessary to restructure schools and learning.

This course offers a framework intended to help educational leaders (principals) recognize quality instructional and curricular practices that lead to school improvement and student success. The course will provide research-based teaching methods, explanations for how to implement them in the classroom, and shows what exemplary instruction really looks like. Students will observe examples of state-of-the-art teaching methods in action.
