Course Catalog Description

A survey of empirically based knowledge of behavior and mentation of individuals

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Critical Thinking Skills (includes creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information). Students will be able to apply their critical thinking skills throughout this class in utilizing video lessons, adaptive assessments, and project-based learning.
- 2. Communication Skills (includes effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication. Students will be able to apply their communication skills through expression of ideas from psychology during project-based learning assignments.
- 3. Empirical and Quantitative Skills (includes the manipulation and analysis of numerical data or observable facts and results in informed conclusions). Students will be able to apply empirical quantitative skills that illustrate an understanding of the techniques and methods of psychology.
- 4. Social Responsibility (includes intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national and global communities) Although psychology is the study of individual characteristics, students are exposed to topics such as social psychology, in which interactions between people becomes the focus, including race relations and prejudice. Individual difference is explored in relation to both "nature and nurture," the latter including contextual differences such as culture. Students will demonstrate an understanding of the factors which affect human interactions and relationships.

- Final Exam (5%)

Please note that grades are weighted by category. While I seek to always have Canvas reflect your current grade as reliably as possible, it cannot completely accurately calculate your grade; do not rely on it solely. At any point during the semester, you can do some simple math to figure out what your current grade is. Please see the example below:

Example Grade Calculation

Student R has an Adaptive Assignment average of 90, a Chapter Project average of 88, and estimates they will make a Final Exam Grade of 80 (since the final is done at the end of the semester you will have to estimate here).

Multiply your averages by the weights above then add each product for your final grade.

Adaptive Assignment Average: 90*.40= 36
Chapter Project Average: 88*.55= 48.4
Final Exam Grade Estimate: 80*.05= 4

36+48.4+4=88.4

FINAL GRADE: 88.4%, B

To calculate extra credit: add the number of points you've earned and divide by the number possible. Then multiply by 5. Add this number to calculations above.

Example: Student R earned 1,000 of 1,000 possible extra credit points.

1,000/1,000=1 1x5=5

36+48.4+4+5=93.4

FINAL GRADE WITH EXTRA CREDIT: 93.4%, A

***Note that if Student R fails to fully complete the Research Requirement in the course, their final grade becomes 83.4%, B. More information about the Research Requirement is located below and within the Canvas course. ***

Teaching Strategies

Please make sure you have logged into Canvas and reviewed the informational messages explaining the workings of this course. The course is organized into modules with your assignments for each week of the semester. **I will make course announcements weekly** to help you keep track of what assignments are due and inform you of any important updates within the course. You can also use the **Course Calendar** feature in Canvas to keep up with your assignments in addition to this syllabus.

The course is structured such that you will work through reading and informational videos for each chapter, followed by an **Adaptive Assignment**. The Adaptive Assignment is an opportunity for you to assess your learning of the material through questions. Concepts over which you demonstrate mastery quickly will be completed, and the assignment will offer you more questions over content which you haven't learned as well. Therefore, the length of these assignments will vary based upon your understanding of the material and are designed to ensure that you do not have gaps in learning. If you prefer to use the adaptive assignments as your way of studying and learning the material, you are welcome to; just remember that they count toward your grade in the course.

Adaptive Assignments

will be open for you to complete any time from 12:00am Monday through 11:59pm Sunday of the week that they are assigned. Because you have a full week to complete them, no late submissions will be accepted.

After the week of studying the chapter and completing the Adaptive Assignment, you will have a short **Chapter Project Based Learning (PBL)** designed to help you integrate the information in various ways. You'll post your projects within discussion board groups with classmates. Grades on these projects will be based on the depth of your demonstrated knowledge of the topic as you complete your project as well as your engagement with classmates, in accordance with the posted rubric.

Your Initial Post (IP) for the

Your follow-up posts must be made
after your IP and before 11:59pm Friday

Because you have a full week to complete them,
no late submissions will be accepted.

The **Final Exam** in this course is a critical thinking essay question. If you have completed all of the adaptive assignments and practiced thinking critically while synthesizing information from the chapters in the projects, there is nothing else for you to study or prepare for the final exam. Typically, it takes

students 20-30 minutes to complete and is **NOT** an optional final exam, no matter what your course average is going in to the final. You may take the final exam any time during the 24-hour window that it's open.

If you do not take the final exam, you will earn an Incomplete in the course until you do so. If you do not complete it within the guidelines of the University following earning an Incomplete grade in the course, the Incomplete will become an F.

If you have 2 other final exams scheduled for this day such that the final for this course would make a 3rd exam on Monday, December 6th, email me on or before Friday, December 3rd in order to arrange to take your exam at a different time.

If you fail to complete the research requirement, your grade will be **dropped** an automatic letter grade.

I encourage you to begin this immediately

Problems **always** arise for students who wait until the last minute.

The Department of Psychology and Counseling <u>requires</u> that all students taking 1000- and 2000-level psychology courses to complete a <u>research requirement</u>. Research Methods and Statistics are exempt from this policy. However, these two courses and certain 3000- and 4000-level courses also may include some type of research experience as either a course requirement or as extra credit.

Withdrawing from Class - Students you are allowed to withdraw (Links to an external site.) (drop) from this course through the University's Withdrawal Portal (Links to an external site.). Final Exam Policy: Final examinations are administered as scheduled. Faculty members are required to maintain student final examination papers for a minimum of three months following the examination date.

Incomplete Grade Policy: If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in lieu of a grade only when all of the following conditions are met: (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all course work or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor; and (c) the student presents these reasons prior to the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average for a student.

The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to complete all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has not been assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F, or to NC if the course was originally taken under the CR/NC grading basis.

Grade Appeal Policy: UT Tyler's Grade Appeal policy requires the completion of a Grade Appeal form for this action to take place. The grade appeal begins with the instructor of your course. If you do not agree with the decision of the instructor, you may then move your appeal to the department chair/school director for that course. If you are still dissatisfied with the decision of the chair/director, you may move the appeal to the Dean of the College offering that course who has the final decision. Grade appeals must be initiated within sixty (60) days from the date of receiving the final course grade.
