Course Catalog Description: Seminars of topical interest in specialized areas of psychology.

Course Description: This class will provide an in-depth overview of Acceptance and Commitment Therapy (ACT) a third wave cognitive behavioral therapy, which integrates acceptance and mindfulness with principles of behavior change. We will review the basic philosophical and research principles that inform ACT and their application. The class will include experiential exercises, role plays, case conceptualization exercises, and reviews of the empirical literature.

Student Learning Outcomes: After participating in the class, you will be able to:

- Understand basic theoretical principles that inform the ACT approach
- Conceptualize how ACT processes play a role in psychopathology and therapeutic change
- Utilize common ACT intervention strategies to target processes contributing to psychological difficulties
- Know the empirical support currently available for ACT
- Describe protocols and adaptations of ACT for common difficulties

Requirements/Grading

- 1. Attendance and participation 10.4% You are expected to attend class in person and participate, coming prepared and having completed the reading, barring unexpected circumstances outside student control. Circumstances such as vacation, other coursework, optional travel (e.g., for family events), and similar would not be considered unexpected circumstances outside of student control.
- 2. Case Conceptualization & Treatment Plan Presentation Assignments 65% Each of you will find a fictional character that is struggling with a diagnosis that you are interested in treating. This should be a character where enough detail is given. You will submit several assignments related to case conceptualization of this character along with a presentation of case conceptualization and treatment plan to the class.
- 3. Student Led Exercise 7.6% Each of you will find an ACT exercise that should take about 10 minutes to complete and lead the class through practicing this and understanding the way it relates to core concepts.
- **4.** Thought Leader Project & Presentation 17% for this project, you will engage in an exercise related to dissemination of empirically supported information associated with ACT or a related approach (e.g., compassion focused therapy, process-based therapy, mindfulness).

Final Exam Policy

Final examinations are administered as scheduled. If unusual circumstances require that special arrangements be made for an individual student or class, the Dean of the appropriate college, after consultation with the faculty member involved, may authorize an exception to the schedule. Faculty members must maintain student final examination papers for a minimum of three months following the examination date.

Incomplete Grade Policy

If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in place of a grade only when all of the following conditions are met: (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all coursework or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor, and (c) the student presents these reasons before the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average.

The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to meet all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has yet to be assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F, or NC. If the course was initially taken under the CR/NC grading basis, this may adversely affect the student's academic standing.

Grade Appeal Policy

Disputes regarding grades must be initiated within sixty (60) days from the date of receiving the final course grade by filing a Grade Appeal Form with the instructor who assigned the grade. A grade appeal should be used when the student thinks the final course grade awarded does not reflect the grades earned on assessments or follow the grading scale as documented in the syllabus. The student should provide the rationale for the grade appeal and attach supporting document about the grades earned. The form should be sent via email to the faculty member who assigned the grade. The faculty member reviews the rationale and supporting documentation and completes the instruction section of the form. The instructor should return the form to the student, even if a grade change is made at this level. If the student is not satisfied with the decision, the student may appeal in writing to the Chairperson of the department from which the grade was issued. In situations where there is an allegation of capricious grading, discrimination, or unlawful actions, appeals may go beyond the Chairperson to the Dean or the Dean's designee of the college from which the grade was issued, with that decision being final. The Grade Appeal form is found in the Registrar's Form Library.

NOTE: The Grade Appeal Form is different from the Application for Appeal form submitted to the Student Appeals Committee, which does not rule on grade disputes as described in this policy.
