#### **Course Overview**

This course examines the historical background and current context of selected individual scales of intellectual functioning. Course emphasis is on the standardized administration, scoring, interpretation, and psychological evaluation report writing of the Wechsler Adult Intelligence Scales (WAIS). Students are expected to have completed an undergraduate or graduate course on psychometrics (e.g., PSYC 5301 Tests and Measurement).

## **Learning Outcomes**

After completing this course, students should be able to:

- Demonstrate competent administration of the WAIS-IV in a standardized and professional manner. This will be assessed by the test administration assignments included in this course.
- Demonstrate competent scoring techniques for the WAIS-IV. This will be assessed by the scoring assignments included in this course.
- Demonstrate competent interpretation of WAIS-IV scores as well as integration of test results with information from client's history and behavioral observation. This will be assessed by the report writing assignments included in this course.
- Demonstrate a broad understanding of clinical psychological assessment and related theoretical concepts. This will be assessed by the lecture quizzes included in this course.

- Students will be provided with case history and test data with which to write sections of a clinical report
- Reports will be graded for clearly worded and well supported interpretations
