Overview: Chicago (Author-Date) is used in the social sciences, sciences, and business. It employs parenthetical in-text citations with an alphabetized reference list.

In-Text Citations

Format: (Author Year, Page)

- The study revealed new insights (Smith 2020, 45).
- Brown and Johnson (2018, 123–125) argue interdisciplinary methods are crucial.

Reference List

Entries are alphabetized by author's last name.

Book: Smith, Jane. 2020. *The Future of Social Sciences*. New York: Academic Press.

Journal Article: Johnson, Robert. 2018. "Globalization and Local Cultures." *Cultural Studies Quarterly* 15(3): 123–145.

Chapter in Edited Volume: Brown, Mary. 2019. "Policy Impacts on Urban Development." In *Modern Governance*, ed. John Taylor, 45–67. Chicago: Univ. of Chicago Press.

- **Font:** Times New Roman, 12 pt
- **Spacing:** 1.15
- **Margins:** 1-inch
- **Indentation:** Hanging indent for references
