Course Description: Elements of professional presentation, writing for publication, and grant writing are examined, including exploration of priorities for funding and publication. Scientific integrity in grantsmanship and dissemination of knowledge is emphasized.

Graded Course Requirements Information:

Module 1: This online discussion will provide us the opportunity to explore the meaning of nursing scholarship particularly in the context of research. You will also identify your research topic and draft a research trajectory statement.

Module 2: You will complete the Responsible Conduct of Research (RCR) Training, which will provide an introduction to research ethics. We will meet with the librarian and review database searches. You will complete a search for articles related to your topic using limiters and create a reference list using APA format.

Module 3: You will evaluate a research article and create an evidence table reflecting your critique.

Module 4: You will create an evidence table for three research articles pertinent to your research topic.

Module 5: You will critique a journal article submitted for publication, compare your critique with that of journal reviewers, and reflect on the process.

Module 6: You will make revisions based on faculty feedback add five more articles to your evidence table. You will create three synthesis tables based on the findings on the evidence tables.

Module 7 – Part 1: You will draft and outline and background and significance section of a research proposal based on literature located to date. You will review a buddy's paper, provide scholarly feedback and based on the feedback make appropriate revisions.

Module 7 – Part 2: Using your evidence and synthesis tables, you will write a synthesis paragraph summarizing one aspect of what you have learned about your topic.

Module 8: You will search for possible funding for your research, share what you learned on a Discussion Board and provide alternate funding ideas for your colleagues.

Module 9: Based on what you learned about your topic, you will create a scholarly PowerPoint presentation and share it real-time with your colleagues and faculty.

Withdrawing from Class: Students, you are allowed to withdraw (drop) from this course through the University's Withdrawal Portal. Final Exam Policy: Final examinations are administered as scheduled. Incomplete Grade Policy: If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in lieu of a grade only when all of the following conditions are met: (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all course work or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor, and (c) the student presents these reasons prior to the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average for a student.

The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to complete all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has not been assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F or NC if the course was originally taken under the CR/NC grading basis.

Grade Appeal Policy: UT Tyler's Grade Appeal policy requires the completion of a Grade Appeal form for this action to take place. The grade appeal begins with the instructor of your course. If you do not agree with the decision of the instructor, you may then move your appeal to the department chair/school director for that course. If you are still dissatisfied with the decision of the chair/director, you may move the appeal to the dean of the college offering that course,

who has the final decision. Grade appeals must be initiated within sixty (60) days from the date of receiving the final course grade. The grade Appeal form is found on the Registrar's Form Library.
