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Course Description: Nursing in Nontraditional Environments (NiNE) will provide the student with a basic understanding and skills required to provide professional nursing care in various non-traditional environments. These environments include remote outdoors locations, disasters, and humanitarian global health missions. Fieldcraft and survival skills are taught to provide basic sustainment for extended amounts of time. Students will learn to create fires, build shelters, and purify water which allows the nurse to provide the basic needs for themselves and patients in austere settings. The pathophysiology of common nontraditional environments includes high altitude injuries, dive injuries, envenomation, animal bites, infectious disease endemic to various areas around the world. This course includes three national certifications: Wilderness Life Support for Medical Professionals, FEMA's Community Emergency Response Team, and Essentials of Disaster Life Support.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify various nontraditional environments and discuss the challenges and resources associated with providing care in each.
- 2. Discuss the nurse's role in and methods of addressing client needs in nontraditional environments utilizing Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs as a theoretical model.
- 3. Describe the continuum of care from pre-event resiliency building through immediate care to Prolonged Casualty Care (PCC) and return home.
- 4. Assess self, family, and community resiliency to provide basic sustainment in a nontraditional environment.
- 5. Be able to demonstrate base survival skills of building a shelter, building a safe fire, and purifying water.

National Certifications

Wilderness Life Support for Medical Professionals (formerly AWLS)

This course balances didactic lectures with hands-on instruction to train students most effectively in managing medical situations in austere environments. This course is designed for licensed medical professionals or medical professionals in training who have an interest in expanding their medical knowledge of wilderness medical pathology and in enhancing their practical skills in a wilderness environment. The course covers a wide range of topics including assessment and treatment in nontraditional environments, various topics of illness and injury prevention, assessment, and treatment. Environmental, high altitude, dive medicine, medical kits, and many other topics. All certification classes are given within the course. Attendance at the final exercise is mandatory and will be the written exam and hands-on evaluation. Currently, the University has funded the cost of this certification.

Community Emergency Response Team

UT Tyler School of Nursing is currently an official FEMA training site for the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). CERT training covers basic skills that are important to know in a disaster when emergency services are not available. With training and practice, and by working as a team, you will be able to protect yourself and maximize your capability to help the greatest number of people after a disaster. Before, during, and after disasters, CERT volunteer teams perform basic response activities, including checking in on neighbors, distributing information to the public, supporting emergency operations centers, and helping to manage traffic and crowds. Local CERT programs train and organize teams of volunteers to assist their families, neighbors, co-workers, and other community members. This training is held over a weekend and is mandatory. Participants will receive a complementary backpack of required equipment.

Essentials of Disaster Life Support certification

Essentials of Disaster Life SupportTM (EDLS) is a 3.5-hour competency-based, awareness-level course, delivered entirely online, that introduces concepts and principles to prepare health professionals for the management of injuries and illnesses caused by disasters and public health emergencies. This includes application of core principles and concepts in emergency management and public health through the PRE-DISASTER ParadigmTM and DISASTER ParadigmTM. The primary focus of the EDLS course is incorporation of an "all-hazards" approach to mass casualty management and population-based care across a broad range of disasters. Measures to ensure and enhance health workforce readiness are emphasized throughout the course. This includes a consistent and scalable approach to workforce protection and casualty management, as well as mass casualty triage and fatality management. Currently, the University has funded the cost of this certification.

Search and Rescue Final Simulation

During the final weeks of the semester, teams of 4-5 students will perform a simulation of locating casualties, provide initial patient stabilization and transport to an extraction site. There you will be moved into a prolonged casualty care situation and must provide care overnight until an evacuation can be made. This will require you and your team to establish a basecamp, providing shelter and thermoregulation for you, your casualty, and your team. This is a mandatory overnight requirement. Further details will be in the course assignment section.

Final course grades less than 75 are not rounded up.

The simple average of all exam grades, including a final, must first be at or above 75% to pass the course. Once the student has achieved a simple exam average of 75% or higher, course grades will be determined based on the weighted calculation of exams and other required course work.

The hands-on skills clinics at mid-term and final are not graded and are for monitored practice and simulation of the skills taught in this course. Final Testing for AWLS will be during the final skills lab.

Portions of the discussion boards will require videotaping your skills including shelter making and casualty assessment.

University Policies and Information

Withdrawing from Class: Students are allowed to withdraw (drop) this course through the University's withdrawal portal. Texas law prohibits students who began college for the first time in Fall 2007 or thereafter from dropping more than six courses during their entire undergraduate career. This includes courses dropped at other 2-year or 4-year Texas public colleges and universities. Final Exam Policy: Final examinations are administered as scheduled. If unusual circumstances require that special arrangements be made for an individual student or class, the dean of the appropriate college, after consultation with the faculty member involved, may authorize an exception to the schedule. Faculty members are required to maintain student final examination papers for a minimum of three months following the examination date.

Incomplete Grade Policy: If a student, because of extenuating circumstances, is unable to complete all of the requirements for a course by the end of the semester, then the instructor may recommend an Incomplete (I) for the course. The "I" may be assigned in lieu of a grade only when all of the following conditions are met: (a) the student has been making satisfactory progress in the course; (b) the student is unable to complete all course work or final exam due to unusual circumstances that are beyond personal control and are acceptable to the instructor, and (c) the student presents these reasons prior to the time that the final grade roster is due. The semester credit hours for an Incomplete will not be used to calculate the grade point average for a student.

The student and the instructor must submit an Incomplete Form detailing the work required and the time by which the work must be completed to their respective department chair or college dean for approval. The time limit established must not exceed one year. Should the student fail to complete all of the work for the course within the time limit, then the instructor may assign zeros to the unfinished work, compute the course average for the student, and assign the appropriate grade. If a grade has not been assigned within one year, then the Incomplete will be changed to an F or NC if the course was originally taken under the CR/NC grading basis.

Grade Appeal Policy: UT Tyler's Grade Appeal policy requires the completion of a Grade Appeal form for this action to take place. The grade appeal begins with the instructor of your course. If you do not agree with the decision of the instructor, you may then move your appeal to the department chair/school director for that course. If you are still dissatisfied with the decision of the chair/director, you may move the appeal to the dean of the college offering that course, who has the final decision. Grade appeals must be initiated within sixty (60) days from the date

of receiving the final course grade. The grade Appeal form is found on the <u>Registrar's Form Library</u>.
