Course Description: This course explores the reciprocity between health care policies and population health.

Prerequisites: Admission to any MSN program or enrolled in the PhD in Nursing program.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify causes of social, political, and behavioral factors that affect health of individuals and populations.
- 2. Identify individual, organizational and community concerns, assets, resources and deficits for social and behavioral science interventions.
- 3. Examine the processes involved in development and implementation of institutional, local, state, and federal policies that impact health care.

- 4. Identify critical stakeholders for the planning, implementation, and evaluation of public health programs, policies and interventions.
- 5. Apply ethical principles to the analysis of a health policy.
- 6. Describe steps and procedures for the planning, implementation, and evaluation of a health promotion program, policies and interventions.

Graded Course Requirements Information:

- **Discussion Board:** Throughout the semester you will participate in group discussions to help you become familiar with concepts related to health policy and population health. Topics vary and are introduced within corresponding modules. Discussion board guidelines can be found in the start here module on Canvas. Grading criteria for assigned discussion board postings can be found within the modules for which they are assigned.
- <u>Population Health Quiz</u>: You will take a quiz over population health content covered in the Module 1 readings. The quiz will be open book, but students are encouraged to read the assigned chapters before beginning the quiz.

- <u>Policy Brief Topic/Existing Policy</u>: The Policy Brief Topic and an **existing** health policy (local, state, or federal law/hospital policy) related to the chosen topic will be submitted for approval prior to submission of the Policy Brief.
- **Policy Brief:** The purpose of the Policy Brief is to succinctly evaluate policy options regarding a specific health care delivery issue to advocate for intervention(s) at the systems level. This Policy Brief will include actionable recommendations to an *existing health policy* to positively impact healthcare. Recommendations will be informed by a literature review of the recently published (within the last 5 years) scholarly evidence available on the subject.
- <u>Health Promotion Project</u>: The Health Promotion for Populations Project has 4 parts (for a total of 40% of your grade). You will be divided into teams for this assignment. Teams will be determined after the first week of the course. Collaboration and participation of all team members will be key to successful completion. Our expectation is that this will be a great experience for all of you as you collaborate with your peers to learn more about population health.
