Course Description: This course emphasizes the importance of the policymaking process as it relates to health care in the United States and helps DNP-prepared nurses become more skilled in health policy advocacy, health policy analysis, and health policy research. The focus is on problem identification and agenda setting, policy analysis, strategy and policy development/design, policy adoption/enactment, and implementation of policy and evaluation of the programs spawned by policy.

- <u>Case Studies:</u> There will be three case study discussions where you will apply concepts from the course text and reply to your peers using the RISE model.
- <u>Assignments:</u> This grade is derived from two major assignments, the policy brief and the personal advocacy engagement assignment.
- <u>Discussions:</u> Throughout the semester, you will participate in group discussions to help you apply concepts related to the course and provide actionable feedback using the RISE model. Topics vary and are introduced within corresponding modules. Grading criteria for assigned discussion board postings can be found within the modules for which they are assigned
- Reflections: You will reflect on various topics and share what you have learned throughout the course.
