Course Description: This course will introduce models of care to improve the health of people with chronic illness. The focus will be on contributing factors, self-management, health systems, delivery system design, clinical information systems, and quality improvement process.

Prerequisites: NURS 3605 (ADN program equivalent) and NURS 3309

Corequisite: Concurrent enrollment in an approved ADN program

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Professionalism: Demonstrate professionalism and the role of the nurse in the decision-making process in the coordination of care for the chronically ill patient. Discuss ethical and legal principles related to nursing practice.
- 2. Patient Centered Care: Recognize patients with chronic conditions and their families as unique individuals with preferences, values and needs.
- 3. Evidence-Based Practice (EBP): Recognize the role of evidence-based practice in the coordination of care for the chronically ill patient as a basis for nursing care.
- 4. Information & Technology: Utilize information and technology to coordinate quality care for the chronically ill patient.
- 5. Quality Improvement: Identify quality improvement initiatives in the coordination of care for the chronically ill patient to improve patient outcomes and the healthcare delivery system.

- Teamwork and Collaboration: Demonstrate the importance of teamwork, collaboration and communication in shared decision-making towards quality patient care for the chronically ill patient.
- 7. Wellness and Prevention: Define wellness and prevention initiatives to promote healthy outcomes in patients with chronic conditions.
- 8. Leadership: Identify the roles of leadership and advocacy in caring for the chronically ill patient.
- 9. Safety: Explain the importance of promoting a quality and safe environment for the chronically ill patient.
- 10. Strengths: Determine how Strengths (signature talent themes) influence the role of the student nurse and clinical decision-making.

Required Textbooks and Readings:

There is no required textbook for this course. All required resources will be provided in Canvas.

The simple average of all exam grades must first be at or above 75% in order to pass the course. Once the student has achieved a simple exam average of 75% or higher, course grades will be determined based on the weighted calculation of exams and other required course work.

Weekly Learning Activities/Reflective Journals: Students will complete various weekly learning activities and reflective journals to expand understanding of chronic care coordination approaches in various settings. See weekly Canvas modules for specific assignment details.

Unit Exams: There will be three 25-question multiple-choice exams. Exams will open on Thursday at 8 am and close on Sunday at 2359. More information will be given on how to prepare for these exams during class, and blueprints will be provided.

Care Coordination Project: This multi-step, semester-long assignment will allow the student to explore course concepts more deeply. See Canvas for specific assignment details.
