Course Description: The focus of this course is population health across the healthcare delivery continuum. Determinants of health and factors that increase the risk for poor health outcomes are examined. Collaborative partnerships, clinical prevention, information systems, and interdisciplinary methodologies to promote equitable population health outcomes will be explored. Students will reflect on their personal strengths and consider implementation strategies to address population health needs in their DNP scholarly project.

4. Assess the impact of current federal, state, regional, local, and organizational policies on health disparities and inequities within populations. (AACN, 3.4)
5. Explain how DNP-prepared nurse leaders can promote advocacy efforts that include the principles of social justice, diversity, equity, and inclusion for populations. (AACN, 3.5)
6. Propose strategies to protect the health of a population during disasters and public health emergencies. (AACN, 3.6)

Participation: Attendance/viewing of course orientation, completion and submission of surveys, and attestation of documents downloaded will be used to derive your grade for participation.

Knowledge Checks: You will complete quizzes over content covered in modules throughout the course. The knowledge checks can be completed as many times as you would like until the deadline for completion. Your highest score will be kept.

IHI and GET PHIT Courses: You will enroll in and complete Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) and GET PHIT courses applicable to content throughout the course.

Population Health Assignments: The population health assignments are divided into three parts. In part one, you will select a target population and describe your population using publicly available data sources with health-related data about your population. In part two, you will explore the county where you live using the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute's County Health Rankings and Roadmaps website. Finally, you will put it all together in part three, analyzing data collected in parts one and two. Next, you will prepare a 5–10-minute presentation on your target population and how to best manage your target population in the county where you live.

Discussions: Throughout the semester, you will participate in group discussions to help you apply concepts related to the course and provide actionable feedback using the RISE model. Topics vary and are introduced within corresponding modules. Grading criteria for assigned discussion board postings can be found within the modules for which they are assigned.

Reflections: You will reflect on various topics and share what you have learned throughout the course.
