Course Description: This course focuses on professional nursing care of at-risk populations. Emphasis is on environmental and demographic factors that influence health. A variety of clinical experiences will be used to apply caring, evidence-based, professional nursing care for persons at risk for or living with chronic conditions.

Prerequisites: NURS 3605 and NURS 3309

- 7. Wellness and Prevention: Reflect on the impact of the social determinants of health on diverse populations. Identify benefits of health, wellness, and preventive interventions in health policy at local, national, and global level. (BSN Essential VII)
- 8. Leadership: Examine community-based activities to promote ethical reasoning, advocacy, collaboration, and social justice. (BSN Essential I)
- 9. Safety: Apply appropriate safety measures to reduce patient and community risks. (DECS C, BSN Essentials II)
- 10. Strengths: Determine how strengths (signature talent themes) influence the role of the student nurse and clinical decision-making.

Final course grades less than 75 are not rounded up.

The simple average of all exam grades, including a final, must first be at or above 75% in order to pass the course. Once the student has achieved a simple exam average of 75% or higher, course grades will be determined based on the weighted calculation of exams and other required course work.

Grade Replacement: Students repeating a course for grade forgiveness (grade replacement) must file a Grade Replacement Contract with the Enrollment Services Center (ADM 230) on or before the Census Date of the semester in which the course will be repeated. Grade

Failure to file a Grade Replacement Contract will result in both the original and repeated grade being used to calculate your overall grade point average. Undergraduates are eligible to exercise grade replacement for only three course repeats during their career at UT Tyler; graduates are eligible for two grade replacements. Graded Course Requirements Information:

<u>Unit Exams</u>: Module I-IV Exams covering course material will be given throughout the semester according to the course calendar. Additional information will be provided in class (60% of your grade).

<u>Final Exam:</u> A comprehensive final exam will be given during final exam week according to the course calendar. Additional information will be provided in class (15% of your grade).

<u>ATI:</u> Includes two practice exams and one proctored exam to be administered on campus. Additional information will be provided in class (15% of your grade).

<u>Quizzes:</u> Includes embedded Canvas E-Quiz assignments for each chapter that are due on a weekly basis, and other items as appropriate. Additional information will be provided in class (10% of your grade).

<u>Clinical Practicum:</u> Includes individualized clinical placement for each student in congruence with meeting course objectives and student learning outcomes. Additional information and clinical placements will be provided in class (Clinical Practicum is pass/fail).
