Presentations Vs. Publications

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- **Publications → reinforce validity of research**
- **Peer-review process designed to “stress test” and solidify research findings**

Presentations Vs. Publications

- Key similarity: general structure

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- Introduction
- Methods
- Results
- Analysis
- Discussion

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- **Methods, data, and results will most likely remain the same**
- **Main difference: how you frame research in Introduction and Discussions/Conclusion sections**

Presentations Vs. Publications

- Let's discuss how to (re)write opening and concluding sections
- Focus on how you contextualize your research

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- Context already established via CFP or keynote address
- Clarifying relevance isn't most important part of most presentations

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- Introductions need to be revised with clear overview of current research
- Where to begin? Start with CFP, keynote address, and/or other panels

Importance of Context

- Discussion and Conclusion sections also establish context
- Explain contributions and point towards future research avenues

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- Presentations can pose hypotheticals, publications should identify actual research
- Concluding sections of publications require more sustained overview of research
- Locate and cite sources that could be used as starting points for further investigations

General Strategies

Working with Sources

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- Publications warrant longer quotes and more sustained analysis
- Including longer quotes in presentations runs risk of obscuring your own focus

Tone and Style

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- Writing “for the ear” is different compared to writing “for the eye”
- Revising with a formal tone is often required

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- The critical terms, frameworks, and authors cited will influence who discovers your work
- Make sure you are selecting key terms that clearly identify your research focus
- Titles can make a difference. Be precise!
