

Chapter 4: Creating a paperless literature review process

- Highlights:
 - The literature review can/should be "both a *creative* process and a *construction*, through critical analysis, rather than a mere *reproduction*" (p. 111, emphasis in the original)
 - "[l]dentifying and organizing relevant sources, reading and annotating them, analyzing then synthesizing ideas across the sources to create an academic argument" (p. 112)
- Citation Management System (CMS) or Cloud Storage
 - Four Stages: S1 locate and evaluate relevant sources of materials; S2 a digital space is selected...either a CMS or a cloud storage device; S3 organize & annotate either in CMS or in cloud storage device; S4 upload annotated sources in the QDAS for synthesis and writing the literature review (p. 113).
 - The CMS should have (1) robust PDF annotation tools; (2) a mobile app to be used during the reading phase; and (3) the ability to collaborate (p. 113).
- Backward and forward searching for articles/resources (p. 118)
- Storing and organizing: CMS like a "virtual filing cabinet" (p. 118) EndNote, RefWorks, Mendeley, Papers, Bookends, Zoltero (p. 118).
- Can upload articles directly into QDAS but would have to self-format citations (how to Vignette on p. 122).
- Reading and annotating sources (pp.125-126). Suggest digital notebooks like Evernote.


