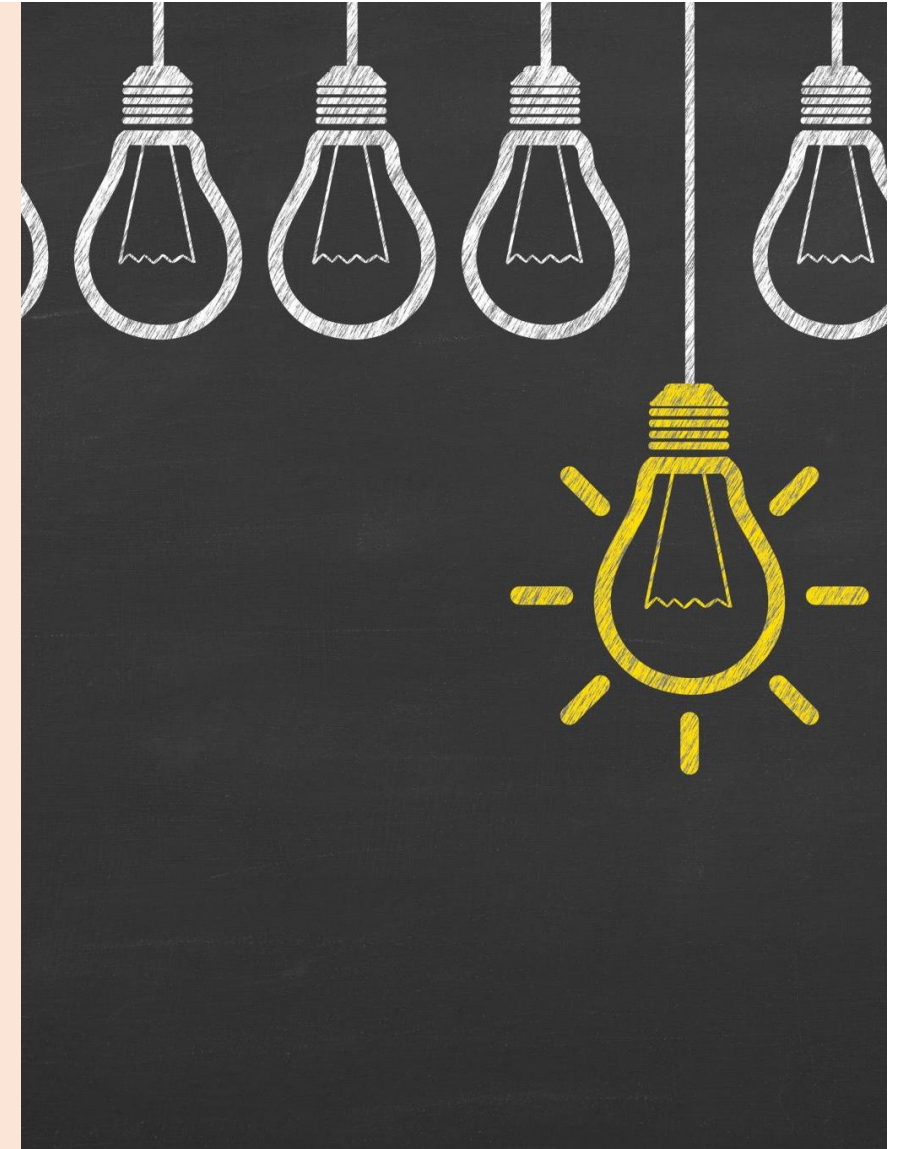

Chapter 7: Transcribing Innovations

- Transcription practices in qualitative research: History (p. 208); Transcription as procedural or positional (p. 209); choices made (p. 209)
- *Partial and situated* representations (p. 212)
- How methodology informs transcription decisions: Jefferson transcription symbols - Figure 7.1 (p. 212) & Figure 7.2 (p. 213); Hammersely "reproduce or construct" (p. 215); Bolden's cautions against automated (p. 215); Vignette 7.2 Screen Capture and chat logs (p. 214)
- Production of transcripts: Table 7.1 (pp. 216-217) critical decisions - questions, methodological considerations, and a CA-informed response
- Various kinds of transcriptions (pp. 219-234): Six types of transcripts - verbatim, Jeffersonian, multimodal, visual, and poetic
- Digital software/tools to support transcription: Inqscribe (p. 220): Software (pp. 235 – 237) Review table 7.4 (p. 237). Look at QDAS packages (p. 240)
- Reflexivity: Where are the boundaries between researcher and tool to get the most accurate transcription for the purpose of the inquiry at hand?

Chapter 8: Managing and Analyzing Data

- Prep data for analysis (p. 249): similar across qualitative research – ethical considerations are embedded in practices
- Decide on a data analytic approach (pp. 251): Vignette 8.1 Nvivo & Dedoose – look through – read top (p. 256)
- "Translation" between strategies and software (pp. 260) - Table 8.1 Transana (p. 261)
- Workflow management
- Align digital tool choice with study aims (pp. 266-287): search data, annotate data, visualize data, and reporting
- Reflexivity: In what ways is the inquiry changed by moving from manual to digital (and back again)?
